The Equinox.

The autumnal equinox may or may not have aiready visited us. Many assert that the steady rains of week before last made up the equinocital sterm, but others maintain that it is yet to come. It generally occurs a few days before or after the time when the sun crosses the line and happens twice a year—once in March, when it is called the vernal equinox, and again in September, when it is called the autumnal equinox. It always produces an atmospheric change, which sometimes manifests itself in high winds and at others in soaking rains. 
