Freedom of Speech, &c. The vagabond lecturer who regaled our people at the Fair with libelous ngues, was mobbed at Scranton a few days since, and it is stated suffered some personal injury. While assault is not justifiable under any circumstances, its occurrence can scarcely be regarded as surprising when in a public speech a lecturer denounces the members of a prominent Christian Church as "thioves, murderers and cut-throats." Those who indulge in violence, whether of speech or action, may naturally ex-

pect to be met by violence.

But upon this event we have sundry disquisitions upon "free speech," and the subject is treated as though every man had a right to say what he pleased in public. Such sentences as that "to speak his thoughts is every freeman's right," &c., are liberally quoted, and if all is to be believed that is said there is and should be no restraint upon the "unruly member." Now all such talk about "free speech" is simply nonsense. In this country there is said to be perfect freedom of action, too. So there is-within just and wholesome bounds-yet if one man steals another's property, or fires his house, or destroys his crops, or bungs his eye, he may find his freedom of action suddenly restrained. So if he libels or slanders his neighbors, or does not keep his " free speech" within the bounds of decency, he may find quite suddenly that there is a limit to the freeman expressing his thoughts too! He may philosophize to his heart's content, he may argufy until he is blue, he may relate history and quote scripture, he may indulge in sarcasm, in ridicule, in wit and in mirth, he may gab till doomsday, but he dare not disturb the public peace or do violence to anybody's private rights any more by speech than by other action. In short, the laws of decency and of public and private rights are to be observed and respected in speechmaking as well as in any other action, and the violation of these by tongue or pen are as open to punishment, reprehension and restraint as if committed in any other way. All men are free to conduct themselves with propriety and behave themselves generally, and freedom that is not thus restrained is no

Mr. Potter, however, is not sure that the uccessors of Queen Victoria will be fit to reign.
