APPOINTMENT.—On Tuesday last Gov. GEARY appointed RUDOLPH H. RINGLER of Bloomsburg, to be Prothonotary and Clerk of the several Courts of this county to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Gen. Ent. The appointment will run until the fall of 1872, when an election will take place for the choice of a regular Incumbent. The action of the Governor in this case was strictly upon party grounds and overruled an application made to him for the appointment of Mr. ZARR, Deputy under Gen. ENT, for the remaining months of the pending term. It was proposed by gentlemen of both parties that Mr. ZARR should contique to perform the duties of the office until a regular election could take place in the interest of the widow and child of the deceased—they receiving from him a due proportion of the proceeds of the office for that time. But the Radical Republican ring of Bloomsburg presented RINGLER for appointment and the Governor acceded to their demand. We are admonished by this transaction that Radical sympathy for the soldiers and for their widows and orphans is a very manageable emotion and can be perfectly controlled when occasion requires. It is not a kind of sympathy at all likely to cause any sacrifice of personal interest or disregard of the smallest morsel of patronage which can be appropriated from the hands of political power.

THE recent vacanty in the office of forma," use i to rob the public. Prothonotary in this county shows an imperfection in the law which should be corrected. In case of vacancy in that office no provision exists for filling It temporarily until an appointment can be regularly made by the Governor; and it might easily happen that heavy losses would be suffered by individuals in consequence. A delay of a single day in entering a judgment, in consequence of a vacancy in the office might cause the loss of a debt, and other inconveniences and evils might be occasioned by the same cause. It would perhaps be well that the Register or Recorder of a county should be authorized to act pro tem pending a vacancy in the latter office or in that of Clerk of the several Courts, so that there should be no interregnum or possible injury to individuals from a vacancy and the interruption of public business.

The selections sent here as original might more safely be kept at home, or be presented for what they are, as our stock of good nature may not always insure the perpetrators against exposure.

If every editor now-adays who charges the President with "political mistake" were similarly treated there would be some wailing from the prisons of the land!

RICHARD PALMER, convicted of voluntary manslaughter at September term, 1870, in Columbia county, was pardoned by Gov.
