II says, "the sum of sixty thou-sand dollars, (\$60,000), or so much there-of as may be necessary is hereby appro-priated out of any moneys in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the purposes specified in this act, of which ten thousand (\$10,000) is exclu-cized to be serviced to be batching as sively to be applied to the hatching es-tablishment in the above section mentioned and the expenses connected therewith, and upon the qualified certicate of the board of fishery commis-sioners as to the services rendered or work done from time to time in accordance with this act, the Auditor General shall issue his warrant or warrants in payment for the same upon the State Treasurer, and if there shall be a balance remaining after the provision in this act contained shall have been complied with, the said balance shall be expended in the further improvement of the fish ways aforesaid where the same shall have been authorized by

This bill does not seem to us unobjectionable, while the object it is designed to promote is highly meritorious. In the first place it has the appearance of "a job." and, therefore, should have received the closest scrutiny before its passage. An attempt was made in the House, however, to pass it by its title, without permitting it to be read, and even the "gag-law," known as the previous question, was attempted so as to cut off debate and amendments.

The appropriation of \$70,000 is large, especially as the whole subject is an experiment. Again, the scope of the bill is entirely local. It does not aim to renovate the fisheries of the entire State, but only certain portions of the Susquehanna. The bill provides for the alteration of four dams on the Juniata, and three on the West Branch, but does not propose to touch one on the North Branch, although a larger and more important stream than both combined.
