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



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

We are told that it is too late in the day to advise the delegates to the Re-publican State Convention, and that we re only struggling against the inevit ble. We hope and believe not. At all able. events, it is our right and duty as a Republican journalist to speak out boldly and plainly.

One word to the Philadelphia delega-tion, which in all probability, will have the deciding vote. These gentlemen know the situation in this city, the gloom of the present and the uncertainty of the future.
