The Taxes of Railroad and Canal Companies.

We publish at length this week the report of the sub-committee of the Judiciary General of the House of Representatives, in relation to the taxes with held from the State by certain corporations chartered by the Legislature. This committee was raised upon a resolution offered by the Representative of this county, and the facts elicited show the necessity for a full investigation. Although a mass of testimony was taken, the data is far from being comtaken, the data is far from being complete, mainly because all sorts of obstacles were thrown in the way of a thorough examination. The Legislature at the instance of corporation lobbyists failed to give the committee the proper authority until too late to be of use, and the witnesses summoned either evaded the subpænas, or failed to at-

As a matter of fact, two thirds of the taxes now imposed by existing laws upon railroad and canal companies are not paid into the State Treasury, and the amount in default will reach at least two millions of dollars! Worse than all, through the negligent manner in which General Hartranft has managed the Auditor General's office, it is impossible to ascertain there the amount due the Commonwealth, as some corn panies have not made complete returns in seven years. Part of the amount due was paid after the investigation began, but the great bulk is still withheld upon technical grounds, and as yet no effort has been made to alter or amend the alleged defective laws.

The report should be perused by all our readers, and the necessity for prompt once apparent.
