1. No nighthawk, whippoorwill, sparrow Darish, lark, finch, martin, swallow, woodocker, flicker, robin, oriole, reedbird, tanager, far bird, eat tird, or other insectiverous birds · be shot or killed at any time of the year,

under a fine of five dollars. 2. Phea-ruts, squirrels, ployer and reed birds cannot be shot between January I and Septemb = 1; parteidges between January 1 and Nov laber 1; woodcock between January 1 and July 4; and rabbits between January 1 and October 1, nor at any time to be hunted with ferrets, under a penalty of ten dollars.

3. No pheasant, partridge, woodcock or reedbird is allowed to be taken by means of any blind, trap, snare, net or device whatever under a penalty of ten dollars.

4. No person can buy game out of season possession being prima facte evidence-under a penalty of ten dollars.

5. Shooting or hunting on Sunday is prohib I ed under a penalty of from ten to twenty-five
