Cotting Grass Early I have been watching a grass field since last July, says a correspondent of the Country Gentleman, a part of which was cut early with a mower, and the rest left three weeks later. The square block of two or three acres in the center of the field, which was cut last, seemed almost killed all the fall. The grass was timothy, and very little aftera half ton of hay per acre, while the outside may go up to a ton and a half. The meadow is past its best, and if the owner is wise he will plow it up and plant it this spring preparatory to re-seeding. Even here the lack f growth last fall must make this part of the sod less valuable, even for plowing under. Add to this that the early cut grass was best for hay, and it makes a strong case for early cutting. It is equally important for clover, and indeed unless clover is kept very closely cut or pastured the second season, so as to prevent its seeding, it is rarely
