

upon a platform before the nominations were made and the Convention adjourned.

Tuesday, the third day, after prayer by Dr. Plumer, Henry C. Murphy, chairman of the committee on resolutions, submitted the report of a platform, which was unanimously adopted.

On a call for the nomination of candidates Connecticut nominated James E. English—Maine nominated Winfield S. Hancock—a delegate from Maine also nominated George H. Peniston—New Jersey offered Josi Parker—New York named Sanford E. Church—Ohio named James H. Peniston—Pennsylvania presented Asa Packer—Tennessee nominated Andrew Johnson—Wisconsin named James R. Doolittle. The result of the first ballot was as follows:

Eight ballots were had on that day, the last being Hancock 144—Peniston 50—Hendricks 57, and the others scoring nothing. On the fifth day Mr. Brodhead of Missouri nominated Francis P. Blair, Jr., of Missouri Mr. Rose, of California, nominated Stephen J. Field, Mr. Valandigham of Ohio, read a letter from Mr. Peniston, withdrawing his name. Two more ballots were had without result.

Before the twenty-second ballot was taken Gen. McCook, of Ohio, in an eloquent speech, nominated Horatio Seymour, of New York. Gov. Seymour, on no more than one previous occasion, declined, whereupon Mr. Valandigham urged and insisted that Gov. Seymour should accept, and gave the vote of Ohio for Seymour, and the call of the States on the twenty-second ballot continuing the unanimous vote was cast for Horatio Seymour.

For Vice President Illinois nominated Gen. John A. McCord—Iowa nominated Henry A. Blair—Kentucky nominated Gen. Thomas Ewing, Jr.—Kentucky nominated Gen. Francis P. Blair, Jr.—The names of all others were withdrawn before a ballot was taken, and Gen. Francis P. Blair, Jr., was unanimously nominated, amidst great applause.

After the usual vote of thanks, etc., the Convention adjourned sine die. The eleventh National Democratic Convention assembled at Baltimore, July 9, 1852. It was largely attended, but the Democratic masses were not in any responsible position for the action of the Convention. It adopted as the candidates to be supported by the Democrats the National Liberal Republican ticket, which had been nominated at Cincinnati on the 1st of May previous. At the Baltimore Convention Mr. Greeley was nominated on the first ballot, receiving 680 votes; the remainder being for:
