The Committee appointed by the President of the last annual county Convention to examine and if thought proper to revise the Rules of nomination of the Democratic party of Columbia, have examined the said rules and now, in pursuance of the Resolution authorizing their appointment, make

It is believed that the classification and arrangement of the Rules according to natural or convenient divisions of subject matter will render them more convenient for use and to some extent more easily understood.

The Rules do not provide for cases of tie votes, in electing delegates or upon instructions nor fully define the powers and duties of the Standing Committee. And it is believed that several of the rules may be more clearly expressed and some of them be shortened and condensed.
