They are all young gentlemen of integrity and ability, and we are informed passed very creditable examinations. We wish them success in their chosen profession.

Soldiers who lost arms or legs in the army and receive \$24 per month pension have not been entitled to commutation for loss of limbs since Congress at its last session amended the law so as to give the class referred to limbs or commutation therefore. Applicants should apply to the Surgeon-General of the army.

A large Democratic meeting at the Opera House was addressed by Capt. Brockway of Monday evening, Sept. 4th. The Bloomsburg Branch furnished the music for the evening. The speech was interrupted by frequent applause, showing that our citizens are becoming interested in the momentous questions of the campaign.

George Fetterman who stole a horse from Douglas Lehigh, an account of which was published last week, pleaded guilty to the charge of horse stealing, in court on Tuesday. He was also indicted for stealing a number of other articles at the same time, to which he pleaded not guilty. The jury called in the case did not agree with him, and convicted him of stealing a pair of trousers. He was remanded to the custody of the sheriff to await sentence.

The Columbia county S. S. Convention met at New Columbia on Tuesday August 29, at 10 a. m. and adjourned on Thursday August 31, Rev. A. Hantz, Rev. Theobald and Aaron Smith were elected delegates to the State Convention. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Rev. D. J. Waller; Vice President, Rev. H. Spang; Secretary, M. W. Nuss; Treasurer, H. C. Bittenbender; Executive Committee, Messrs. Dechant and Mitchell, and J. W. Harman.

TO THE UNSATIALIZED.—There are a considerable number of persons in this city who have not taken out their naturalization papers. For their information the following requirements are published: First—Male persons who have served in the army and been honorably discharged are entitled to their citizens papers upon proving one year's residence in the United States and in the state where the application is made.

Second—Male persons who came to the United States under eighteen years of age, have been in the country five years (one of the five in the state), and are over twenty-one years old, and produce a certificate that they were in the United States for one year, are entitled to citizenship.

Third—Male persons who have declared their intention to become citizens in a court of record, two years before making application for citizenship, when they have been in the United States five years (one of the five in the state), and are over twenty-one years old, and produce a certificate who will swear to the same, are entitled to citizenship.

On Monday morning the Town Council was held in the Council room on Wednesday evening, September 6th, all the members present. A petition for crossings in Scott-town was presented by A. Lewis, and on motion of Messrs. Holman and Hagenbach it was ordered that the crossings be put down. On motion an order for three dollars was drawn in favor of J. C. Brown; also an order in favor of O. A. Jacoby for colic and crossing stone, amounting to \$204.68. A bill presented by John Hicks for damages was referred to the Solicitor.

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SAD AFFAIR.—Howard E. Fink aged between eight and nine years, and son of Wm. Fink, of Moravian township, was found, on Friday last at about 11 o'clock in the horse in company with a little sister about four years old, accidentally hung himself with a horse halter. This is certainly a most distressing affair, and the afflicted family have the sympathy of the entire community in this sad bereavement.—*Weekly Luminary.*

The Republicans held a meeting in the Opera House on Tuesday evening which was well attended, a large number of Democrats being on hand to hear what the administration party has to say for itself. Their washing place is in a shallow well by a small stream of water. They had their heads bent over the tub, and Emma again went to wash, and stirred the fire and then commenced washing, but soon discovered that her clothes were on fire. Some of the family were still sitting at the table, and hearing her cries for help, they rushed out and saw her running towards the house enveloped in flames. But before they reached her, her limbs, and part of her body were literally roasted.

Dr. Robbins and Son were summoned, but all human aid was vain, and about 11 o'clock at night her suffering ended in death. She was sensible to the last and her last words were, "Lord save me." In this sad bereavement her family has lost a dutiful daughter, and an affectionate sister, and her associates a dear friend, in whose memories she will ever be held most dear.
