THE DEATH OF PETER ENT.
On Saturday, last the sad intelligence reached us that Peter Ent was no more. He died that morning between the hours of nine and ten o'clock. Mr. Ent had been in ill health for a long time and his demise was not entirely unexpected. The immediate cause of death was chronic bronchitis, but he had suffered from an affection of the heart, which doubled, had seriously impaired his health and conducted to the fatal result. The funeral took place on Tuesday and was largely attended.

February 24th 1811 and was therefore in the 86th year of his age. He learned the carpenter's trade with George Meers and finished his trade when about 21 years old. He married Miss Sarah H. Myers, October 15th 1833, by whom he had five children. Of these William H. died in 1871; William M. in 1869 and Ual H., Robert S. and Oscar P. survive. In 1837 or 1838 he moved to Light Street where he lived until he followed his trade until 1842 and then engaged in erecting buildings and bridges in all parts of the county. In 1846 he was elected County Commissioner and served for three years. During his term of service the County seat was removed from Danville to Bloomsburg and the present County buildings were erected. In December 1849 he engaged in the mercantile business at Light Street and continued therein until 1853. In 1853, '54 and '55 he was Collector of Taxes at High Hill. In 1857 and '58 he served as Representative in the State Legislature for the district then composed of the counties of Columbia, Montour, Sullivan and Wyoming. In 1858 he entered into partnership with George Martz, in the iron manufacturing, milling and mercantile business, under the firm name of Martz & Ent. In 1861 he bought Martz's interest and continued the mill and store until 1905, when in company with his son he again embarked in the manufacture of iron under the firm name of Peter Ent & Son, and continued until 1883. In 1871 he relinquished the mercantile business and until the end of his life gave his attention to milling and lumbering.

Mr. Ent's life has been one of unceasing business activity. He was known throughout the county and universally respected for his many personal and public virtues and his energy. His influence in the community was very large and was never exerted for other than good ends. His friends could be numbered by scores and there will be genuine sorrow in every part of the county when the report of his death is read.

At a ripe age, after an active and useful life, the spirit of a good man has passed to Him who gave it, and he is now enjoying that perfect rest which follows a career on earth characterized by charity and benevolence.
