Stable Ventilation

The object of ventilation to any apartment which constitutes the abode of aniis to procure a constant supply of fresh air to meet the demand of the animal economy. The practice which has long air and thefoul air of a stab le, and, consequently, if the admission of fresh air is wanted to expel the foul, they immediately conclude it must be cold, and do barm. Now, it is the proper action of ventilation to le away all and no more of the warm air of a at able than what is foul, and then, of course no more than the same quantity of fresh air can find its way into it.

A ready means of letting out the foul air from a stable is by a number of ventilations on the ridge of the roof; and one means of admitting fresh air below, is by the windows when they are open; but when they are shur, other means must be applied. As doors and windows are usually situated in farm-stables, the fresh air should not be allowed toenter by them through the night so they should not be left open, for fresh air e ming directly from the doors or windows upon a horse must strike his body and Limbs forcibly, and do him more harm than good. The feeh air should come in on a level with the horse's nostrils, and an open ing ab ve his read seems the most suitable place for fort air to find its way out .- Wes

#### Fast Walking Horses.

It has been shown in these columns that the production of thoroughbred and trotting horses has been largely in excess of the death rate, that as a necessary sequence the stock in the country is increasing from year t , year, and that unless a foreign demand be created prices must inevitably decline Breeders should therefore turn their attention more to the production of fast-walking horses, both for the saddle and genera draught. The business would pay handsomely, for the utility and value of such horses would soon be properly appreciated, thus creating a steady demand, which would not likely be diminished, for the next half eculury at least. On the farm a slow-walking horse does not do half the work that a rapid walker is able to accomplish. In towns and cities where draught horses are used in the truck, cart, dray, &c., it is the same; not half the work is performed by the slow walker, who crawls along at snail's pace, and, when drawing a load, can not be galvanized into rapid motion. As a traveler, both under saddle and in harness the slow walker is a nuisance. No matter what work he is engaged in, time and mon ey are lost to his owner every day that he lives .- Pen & Plote.

#### Making Superphosphate at Home.

Break the bones into small pieces; after this is done soak them in water, then add fifty pounds of sulphuric acid to every one hundred pounds of bones. When the bones ere dissolved they are liable to set solid. To prevent this, mix earth with the mass, and the bone fertilizer is ready for use. But it is a pretty well known fact nowadays that it does not pay for a farmer to make his own superphosphate. The profit on making it is small even when it is made in large quantities. A farmer would have to pay a larger price for the small amount made than a manufacturer would give who was purchas ing large quantities at wholesale. The difference would eat up all the profits. The adge in making it one's self is that the superphosphate would be pure, and therefore worth more than a great deal of what is sold as superphosphate. Indeed the adulteration of commercial fertilizers is carried to a scandalous extent. In England and some of the United States governments netion has been taken to protect the farme from fraud in this direction.

### Watering Horses After Feeding.

The National Live Stock Journal, in giv ing directions for the care of horses, says "Another common fault in the alimentation of horses is the leading to water just after full feed of grain. The first effect of this is to largely distend the stomach, and the result may be as serious as if the material were musticated grain and saliva. But should this danger be avoided, matters are not necessarily left in a better state. The sudden and excessive influx of water is likely to wash on much of the contents of the stomach into the intestines before the nitrogenous principles have been digested, and fermentation, extrication of gases, over distensions, colics and inflammations result. Even this is not all. The application of an excess of cold water on the mucous membrane of the stomach and intestines cause vascular congestion and violent muscular contractions, so that all tend to digestive disorder of a dangerous nature. Copiondraughts of iced water are hurtful alike to man and beast. If it must be taken it should be in small quantities only and frequently. But a drink of water of moderate temperature, just after a feed of grain, is full of peril to the soliped. Thirst should be allayed before the feed is given; and if any is allowed after, it should be merely a mouthful, until the lapse of one or two hours time has been had for gastric digestion, After a feed of hay there is comparatively little danger. From the excessive salivary addition to the hay, and the comparatively small amount of its albuminoids, these are rapidly dissolved out and digested, and the further addition of water is often rather fa verable than otherwise in hast nog its progress into the bowels, where the digestion of its starch, sugar, fat and other respiratory elements may be completed.

STRAW FOR THE FIELDS .- If I could have my entire farm covered with boards lying flat on the ground a whole year, says a correspondent, I would expect more benefit than from twenty-five loads of barnyard manure to the acre. Now so far as the straw goes it has a similar effect. I believe the very best use of straw, except as litter for the stables or barnyards, is to spread it on the fields. I put straw on my wheat last season with manifest improvement to the clover, but in that I was disappointed. I noticed small spots where the straw had been in bunches the clover was out, having been smothered apparently. I took up boards from a space about twenty feet square after they had laid two years, and planted potatoes, the surrounding ground being al so planted. Where the boards had laid I had three times as many bushels as on a like plot adjoining.


