DEFENDANTS AS WITNESSES.—The governor has signed an act which provides that in the trial of all indictments, complaint and other proceedings against persons charged with the commission of crimes or offenses, except those of a technical nature, the defendant, and in criminal jurisdiction, the person so charged shall be his own witness, but not otherwise, be deemed a competent witness, but his or her neglect, omission, or refusal to testify shall not create any presumption against him or her, nor shall any reference be made to, nor shall any comment be made upon such neglect, omission, or refusal by counsel in the case during the trial of the cause.
