The Army Bill.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 -The Army bill passed to-day with the clause reducing the army to 20,000 men, a hard won success for the Committee on Appropriations. It is considered well nigh certain for those familiar with the temp r of the Senate that neither the reduction of the army nor clause requiring certain troops to be stationed on the Texan border will be accepted. When they are rejected the contest of last spring will be begun again. The debate to-day had no special interest save for the unexceptionally sound doctrine upon the support of a standing army laid down by Mr. Hewitt. The vote upon the principal amendment, which was carried by a majority of six, showed that with decent exertion and a clear understanding, there is no difficulty in holding a Democratic majority. When this does not happen, mismanagement is usually at the bottom of the occurrence, or reckless absenteeism.


