THE PROPOSED AGRICULTURAL BILL.

During the present session of the Legislafure an application will be made for the passage of an act to repeal special Act 687 relative to appropriations out of county funds to agricultural societies, approved the 4th day of May 1864. The object of this proposed net as stated in the notice, is to entitle the Cofumbia County, Agricultural, Horticultural und Mechanical Association to representation In the State Board of Agriculture, created by an Act approved the 5th day of May, 1876. Special Act number 687, above referred to rends as follows : Be it enacted, &c., That the fourth section of the Act of the 29th March Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and fifty one, entitled "An Act to incorporate the Pennsylvania State Agricultural horticultural society, organized in any of the the same is hereby repealed, so far as it apelies to the County of Columbia."

Section 1, of the Act of 1876 establishing a State Board of Agriculture is as follows : Beit enacted &c., That the governor of the | initiatory of thi swork. It will be seen that Columbia county is not entitled to representation in the state board. because it can draw no bounty from the countrial aloth, ty. This proposed legislation is to enable i to receive a sum not exceeding one hundred ast a give it representation. We are in tavor of any movement that will advance the interests of agriculture, and shall be glad to se any legislation that will accomplish that end but we cannot see how the citizens of the county are to be benefitted by the payment aunually of one hundred dollars to the Agricultural Society out of the public funds.

Will it pay? The reasons that are claimed for this proposed act are probably that by representation in the state board we will be entitled to the agricultural reports for distribution among farmers and others. Section 8 of the act of 1876 provides that "The Secretary and board shall, in each year, cause to be made and published for distribution as full an abstract of the returns from the local societies as the board may deem useful." Everybody knows what agricultural reports are scattered through the country, about one person in five hundred receiving a copy. Ssome who do get them use them for the purpose of filling empty shelves until something better comes in, while the majority use them for waste paper. Copies of these reports are
