STROUDSBURG, October 1.1878. The Democratic conference of the Eleventh Congressional district met here to-day. Lackawanna had a full delegation present, and Luzerne, Montour and Pike recognized the Lackawanna conferees, which led the conferces of Carbon, Columbia and Monroe to refuse to join them. The last named counties are either partially or wholly friendly to Robert Klotz, and they organized another conference, into which a contesting delegation from Luzerne was admitted. The anti-Klotz conference met at 11:30 this morning and after organization adjourned until 2:30, and the Klotz conferers from Carbon, with those from Monroe and Columbia, were invited to come into united conference at that time, but they refused and they met at the Indian Queen Hotel. The anti-Klotz conference met at 2:30 and balloted five times for a nominee without effecting a choice, when an adjournment was carried until 7:30 this evening. The Klotz conference also adjourned without making a nomination after electing a committee on credentials, that reported in favor of the admission of he contesting delegation from Luzerne, hus giving Luzerne a full delegation in both erences. Mr. Buckalew's Speech.

The first Democratic meeting of the campaign was held at the Opera. House on Satorday evening, and was well attended. The meeting was organized by the election of the following officers:

Mr. Buckalew spoke for an hour upon Fi ance and Money, commencing with the expression of his surprise at the unhesitang confidence with which persons, apparently not well qualified to speak upon these subjects, expressed themselves regarding them. He did not claim to be an expert a finance, nor assert that his opinious were infallibly true, but he chose to express hose opinions at this time.

The Constitution authorizes the Govern neat of the United States, "to coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign ain, and fix the standard of weights and measures." It also provides that "no State shall coin money, emit bills of credit, or make anything but gold or silver a tender in payment of debts." The grant to the general government plainly was of a power to reate coined money as a standard or test of alues, in connection with the power to fix andard weights and measures and regulate he relative value of foreign coin, and as the lower was to be exclusive we have the prosibition upon the States, Mr. Webster long since pointed out the fact, that it was quite nnecessary to extend to the general government the prohibition against making anything but gold and silver a legal lender for he payment of debts, because that governnent was one only of granted powers.

The Supreme Court of the United States has however held, that the legal tender greenback notes, issued during the war, of which \$340,000,000 are unredeemed, were lawfully issued. This decision was made by a usjority only of the judges and was placed by them expressly and solely upon the war ower possessed by Congress. Virtually and clearly it denied the power of the government to issue such notes in time of peace.

The proposition now made to issue an inreased amount of legal tender notes, however desirable it may be thought to be, is not therefore practicable. Two-thirds of each House of Congress may propose and threefourths of the States adopt an amendment to the Constitution authorizing them, but many years must elapse before such an amendment could be secured, even if a sufficient amount of public opinion could be gradually formed in its favor. It is idle then to speak of this measure as one of immediate relief, or of relief in the near future.


