As we go to press nothing certain is known, except that the Nationals, who expected to sweep Ohio, the crad'e of Greenbackism have lost on their vote, the Republican members of the organization, as we always predicted. going back to their party, leaving enough Democrats in it to throw the State to the Republicans. The Times gives the following summary, which shows considerable Demoeratic gains :

The elections yesterday appear to have re-sulted in a victory for the Republicans in Ohio. The latest returns indicate that the Republicans have overeame last year's Demo-cratic plurality of 22,500 and elected their, state ticket by a shall plurality, and 10 of the 20 Congressmen.
