Counties are not Municipal Corporations within the meaning of the 8th section of the 16th article of the Constitution nor of the Act of 13th June 1874, providing for appeals in certain cases.

The taking of private property for the pur-pose of highways under the general ros pote of highways under the general road laws, is not by virtue of any privilege in-vested in the counties, but is an act of pow-er on the part of the State, exercised through No appeal lies to the Court of Common Pleas

In pursuance of an order issued out of the Court of Quarter Sessions of this county, the

The Act of 1874 was passed for the purpurpose of carrying into effect the 8th section of the 16th Article of the Constitution, and in its first section provides as follows In all cases of damages assessed against any municipal or other corporation or individual or individuals, invested with the priviege of taking private property for publicuse, for property taken, injured or destroyed by he construction or enlargement of their works, highways or improvements whether such assessments shall have been made by Court, and an appeal is not provided for or property for public use for highways. regulated by existing laws, an appeal may A farmer told us the other day that he won thirty days from the ascertainment of the Court pursuant to any general or special Act, and not afterwards."

Under the general road laws of the State counties are required to pay damages caused by the laying out and opening of roads through improved lands.

The questions which are presented in conthe term municipal corporations was intended to embrace counties, and in this whethby law upon the Courts of Quarter Sessions taking private property for public use.

The term municipal, originally signifying a free town or city, is now generally applied to incorporate ddistricts, having charters granted by the legislature, or which have been erected into a borough by a decree of the Courts under general laws enacted for

The primary and fundamental idea of nunicipal corporation is an agency to regulate and administer the internal concerns of a locality in matters peculiar to the place incorporated, and not common to the state or people at large.

In his excellent treatise on Municipal Corporations Judge Dillon in volume 1 page 94 says: "Corporations intended to assist in the conduct of local government are someimes styled political and semetimes public, sometimes civil and sometimes municipal and certain kinds of them-with very restricted powers-quasi corporationsall these by way of distinction from d from private corporations. Thus an incorporated school or county as well as city, is a public corporation; but the school district or county, properly speaking, is not,

while the city is a municipal corporation.

In the case of Hamilton County vs. Mighels 7 Ohio St. Rep. 109, the distinction beween municipal corporations proper, such as chartered towns or cities and involuntary uasi corporations such as counties is thus sointed out by Brinkerhoff J. in delivering the judgment of the Supreme Court, "Mu nicipal corporations proper" he observes 'are called into existence either at the direct solicitation or by the free consent of the persons composing them for the promotion of their own local and private advantage and convenience. On the other hand, Counties are at most but local organizations which for the purpose of civil admistration are invested with a few functions characteristic of a corporate existence. They are local subdivisions of a state, created by the sovereign power of the state of its own sovereign will without the particular solicitation, con sent or concurrent action of the people who inhabit them. The former (municipal) organization is asked for, or at least assented to by the people it embraces; the latter organization, (counties) is superimposed by a sov-

ereign and paramount authority." A municipal corporation proper, is created mainly for the interest, advantage and convegience of the locality and its people; ounty organization is created almost exclusively with a view to the policy of the state at large, for purposes of political organization and civil administration in matters of finance and the general administra ion of justice. With scarcely an exception all the powers and functions of the county erganization, have a direct and exclusive eference to the general policy of the state

and are in fact but a branch of the general administration of that policy." Counties are therefore purely auxiliaries of the state; and to the general statutes of he state they owe their creation, and the tatutes confer upon them all the powers hey possess, prescribe all the duties they owe and impose all the liabilities to which they are subject. Considered with respect to the limited number of their corporate powers, they are most frequently termed quasi corporations to distinguish them from municipal corporations proper. The statute of 1834, Ligest 295, does not

ly confers certain powers to be exercised as corporate body. It confers no authority to make by laws or rules or regulations for he government or convenience of the peovest them with the powers and privileges universally invested in incorporated districts

In Commonwealth vs. Morrisy 6 Weekly Notes 72 it was held that a school treasurer is a municipal officer within the meaning of the Act of 1860 which makes it a misdemeanor for any state, county, township or municipal officer to convert to his use the funds entrusted to him for safe keeping. In delivering the opinion of the Court Mr. Justice Woodward said the character of counties and townships as municipal corporations

understand him to mean by this anything nore than that they can exercise certain limited powers as if they were a corporation. It appears to me that the exact status of counties was stated by Mr. Justice Geo. W. Woodward in Kittaning Academy vs. Brown, 5 Wright 272. He says. "If counties were municipal corporations they would have the power of regulating their internal police by what the old Romans casiled leges munici viewers to whom it was directed reported pales. But they lack the legislative faculty that they had viewed and laid out for public and so are not strictly corporations, still they are quasi corporations. They can perform near George Zeigler's in Scott township to a many of the functions of municipalities.

To the same effect and nearly in the same language is the opinion of Mr. Justice Mercur in delivering the opinion of the Supreme Court in Comth. vs. Beamish 3 Weekly Notes 111. In other States the same view is taken as will be seen by numerous cases by reference to 3 U.S. Digest 616.

I am therefore of opinion that alhough counties may exercise certain limited and lefined powers as if they were corporations, they are not municipal corporations within the meaning of the section of the constitution, and of the Act of Assembly under con-




