

TAX COLLECTORS TO BE ELECTED.

An act to regulate "collection of taxes in booughs and townships," finally passed the Senate very year thereafter, the electors of each bor ough and township in this State shall elect a collector of taxes," whose term of office shall numence on the first Monday of April and ontione one year. The Court of Quarter Sessions is authorized to fill vacancies occuring. Before entering upon his duties the collector robable amount of taxes that shall come into their duplicates of taxes to the collectors of the sale of nearly sixty thousand volumes. collectors are vested with all powers under existing laws, and are allowed a commission two per centum of all taxes paid to them. During the month of September the taxes charged against them for the current year are to be enitled to a reduction of five per cent. The taxes upon unwated land are not to be placed it the hands of the collector, but certified and re turned to the County Commissioners, who shall collect them as heretofore. The act is not to apply to any taxes the collection of which is egulated by a local I aw-

The Law of Public Sales.

As there are a great many sales of persona

property throughout the country at every ason of the year, we call the attention of auctioneers and venders to a few facts which are furnished by a cotemporary. In a sale by auction there are three parties, namely the owner of the property to be sold, the auctioneer, and a portion of the publie. The articles must be sold without reserve, and unless the vender reserves one open bid he cannot bid himself or have the auctioneer or any one else to bid for him. There are cases on record where a bid was not reserved, and the vender had a bidder who bought in, and afterwards suit was brought against the vender by the highest outside bidder for the article, and it was decided that he, the plaintiff, was the highest hidder and entitled to he article against the vender. So, also, if an article is struck off to a person, and if afterwards ascertained that the vender or metioneer practiced fraud, by holding himself, or nod puffers, it was held both by the Courts of England and so repeatedly decided by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, that the purchaser could not be held, but the purchaser, as he discovers the fraudpracticed on him, must return or tender the

article to the vender. Buying School Books
