THE PROPOSED MINERS HOSPITAL. The commissioners to select a site for the proposed Miners' Hospital in Bristol township and Girard Manor on the 30th inst., after looking at sites at Pottsville. They traveled through the region in the special engine "Witch" of the Reading Railroad Company. The commissioners were very favorably impressed with a site offered by Charles Barber in the western part of Pottsville. The borough Council of that place has appropriated \$10,000 to improve any site selected within the borough limits but sites are offered in Dauphin, Northumberland, Columbia, and Carbon counties, and all these will be visited before a decision is made. It is said that a majority of the commissioners lean toward the upper part of Schoykill county, and hence there is an impression that the site finally selected will be somewhere in the Mahanoy valley.
