THE WILLIAMSPORT COUNCILS. Judge Elwell file I his opinion on Saturday the 25 inst., in the case of the members of the Common and Select Councils of Williamsport, who were summoned before him to show that they were not in contempt for having failed to make provision for the payment of interest now due and unpaid on the city bonds. The Councils responded to the rule of Court by making answer, by sworn affidavit, that they had made proper effectively. The verdict of the jury finds that the Act of Assembly passed April 7, 1846, Pamphlet Laws 1846, page 364, was extended to Columbia county, by Act passed 27 March 1848, Pamphlet Laws 1848, page 270, and that same is now, and was on the 12th December, 1876 in force in this county. And that on that fort to rise the interest, by laying an extra assessment, but only a few thousand dollars had been collected, and that they had no intention of resisting the decrees of Court. This last proceeding was the result of a foolish movement of the Councils some time ago looking to the surrender of the city charter and repudiation. After reviewing the case at some length, Judge Elwell decrees that the rule shall be made absolute, but it is not to

be executed by the arrest of any of the Councilmen, who shall, within ten days, execute and file bonds in the Bloomsburg Court to the Commenwealth in the penal sum of \$1,000 each for appearance on the 5th of May or other subsequent time fixed by the Court, of which they shall have five day's notice, to answer for the proper performance of their duty The City Treasurer is also ing among some of the councilmen, as they did not expect that bail would be demanded for the performance of their duty, and had been boasting about the streets that the Court was at the end of its string. At the first regular meeting of the Council on Monday night an ordinance was introduced looking to a settle ment of their financial difficulties, and they have manifested a disposition to end the unpleasant condition in which Williamsport has been for several years. This is the only wise and sensible plan that can be adopted, and the sooner, the

ANGRY MEMBERS.

In retaliation for the opinion of the Attorney General, concerning the pay of members of the Legislature, Senator Laird, of Westmoreland, has introduced a bill providing for the purishment of the State Treasurer and Auditor General if they should allow the Attorney Gen eral more than the salary of \$3,500 : year, which the law gives him for his ervices as Attorney General in addition to fees not exceeding \$7,000 annually, arising from the collection of commonwealth claims upon which he is allowed five per cent. for collection. Since his appointment, Mr. Palmer's fees have aggregated twice the amount of his salary. can help it. The constitution may interfere a little with the proposed reduction, as one of its provisions sets forth that neither the salary nor fees of a public officer shall be increased or diminished during the time for which he

may be elected or appointed. Senator Norris' bill fixing the salary of members of the Legislature at \$1,500 for each regular session exceeding one hundred days, was reported in the Senate on Friday and had the effect of brighten-ing up the grave countenances of the senators. The proposition makes it possible for members to obtain \$500 for one day's services and looks like more retaliation on the Attorney General. committee which prepared the bill had before it a suggestion that for \$1,500 the members remain in session one hundred and fifty days, but it was not favorably entertained. There is no doubt that the Governor's assurances have led to the preparation of this relief measure, but it is feared that the Attorney General may decide that it cannot con-stitutionally be used to apply to the stitutionally be made to apply to the present Legislature.

HAWKING AND PEDDLING.

The following opinion of the court, filed March 26th, 1881, in the case of the Commonwealth vs. John Hughes, will be found of interest to merchants in particular, and the public in general. It explains itself. QUARTER SESSIONS OF COLUMBIA COUNTY. SPECIAL VERDICE.

The first count in the indictment charges that the defendant did unlawfully sell, as a hawker and pedler, foreign and domestic goods, wares and merchandise, to wit: Oysters, contrary, &c. The second count charges that he did un-lawfully expose to sale as a hawker and pedler, foreign and domestic goods, wares and merchandise, to wit: Oys-

force in this county. And that on that day in the Town of Bloomsburg, in citizens of said town, and did go from place to place crying oysters in the streets. But whether he is guilty of an offense punishable by law is submitted to the Court. If the facts set sorth, constitute in the opinion of the Court an offense, they find the defendant guilty, otherwise verdict for the defendant.

The Act of Assembly referred to in the verdict in force here is in the words fol lowing: "No person shall sell or expose to sale, within the county of (Schuylkill,) Columbia, as a hawker, peddler or trav-eling merchant, any foreign or domestic goods, wares or merchandise, under penalty of fifty dollars for each and every included in the decree. > The two words "hawker" and "ped ller," as employed in statutes are nearly, if not quite, identical in meaning; and each of them signifies an itinerant ven-dor of goods. Bishop on Statutory, Crimes Sec. 1074. In Abbott's Law Dictionary, page 552,a hawker is defined to be "a person who practices carrying about merchandise from place to place for sale; as opposed to one who sells at an established shop." It is equivalent to "peddler," which is more used at the present day. It is generally understood from the word that a hawker is one who not only earries goods for sale, but seeks for purchasers, either by outery, or by attracting notice and attention to them as in that city. goods for sale, by an actual exhibition of or exposure by placards or labels, or by a signal like the sound of a horn for sale of fish. meaning of the statute.

The word "goods," in its largest sense signifies all a man's property other than real estate. Bishop Statutory Crimes, Sec. 344. 1 Abbott's Law Dictionary 537. In criminal statutes, particularly in statutes against larceny, it is not understood to have the full meaning as above indicated—choses in action, bank notes, mortgages, deeds and the like are exceptions. But with these and some other exceptions, not necessary to be mentioned here, this word seems to in clude everything of a personal nature.
