## THE NATIONAL BANKS.

The charters of 392 National Banks will expire before the end of next February and among the pseudo financiers in Congress it is feared there are some who will pertinaciously oppose the re-newal of these charters. Banks are a commercial necessity and if they are compelled to withdraw their circulation and close up their affairs it would subject the business interests of the country to serious embarrassment, and might possibly result in a disastrous panic. According to their recent reports these banks have loaned \$150,000,000 to business men, they have outstanding all negotiations upon the refusal would have to be called in during the their slate and agree to a convention to next six months.
