The river and harbor bill which has been completed by Congress appropriates \$15,000 for the Susquehanna river. It appropriates \$4,123,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to improvement of the Mississippi river from the head of the passes to Cairo, including the harbors of New Orleans, Natchez, Vicksburg, Memphis and the rectification of the Red and Atchafalaya rivers, at the mouth of the which sums shall be expended by the Secretary of War in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates of the engineers' department of the army which, having been approved by the Secretary of War, may be adopted by the commission for such parts of the river as the commission may not have the survey of. It provides, however, that no portion of this appropriation shall be expended to repair or build levees for the sole and exclusive purpose of reclaiming lands or preventing injuries to lands by overflows. The aggregate amount appropriated by the bill for the improvement of rivers and harbors (exclusive of the amount ap-propriated for the Mississippi and Missouri rivers) is about ten and one-half millions of dollars.

The Cameron Will Case.

The somewhat famous William Cameron will case was finally disposed of yes terday by the Supreme Court affirming the decision of Judge Elwell sustaining the will. The chief contestant was Mrs. Jane Harrison, daughter of the testator, who receives under the will about one-tenth as much as her sister, Mrs. John B. Packer, receives of the nearly a million and a half of their father's estate. The case has been fought with great ability and much bitterness by a number of distinguished lawyers, and Mr. Packer, prominent as an ex-Congressman of considerable reputation, was severely criticised by JudgeBlack and others in the argument for the contestants, because he had written the will that gave the bulk of the estate to his wife. The Supreme Court, however, take occasion to vindicate Mr. Packer by declaring in the opinion that there is nothing in the evidence "to impeach the character of the gentleman by whom the will was drafted for integrity or professional propriety. It was an up hill effort to defeat the will in the Supreme Court after it had been so broadly sustained by Judge Elwell.
