All celery growers are aware that the ground cannot be too strong for the plant. It has a very small root and can gather only a short supply of fer-tilizing substances; hence the soil should be as rich as possible in order that there shall be within reach of the roots a needed amount of nutriment.

Our method has uniformly been to set the plants in single rows, as by it we have always obtained the targest stalks, and have found them to blanch better and to be tenderer and sweeter. Perhaps more in quantity can be obtained from planting two, three and four rows together, but our experience has been, so far as the supply for do-mestic use is concerned, that the single row is to be preferred.

Alany persons set their plants very nearly on the surface of the ground, as

they would a cabbage or tomato, and depend upon banking up the rows. This requires a wide space between the bast rows to supply the neccessary soil, while any advantages it may possess we never could discover. Our plan is to dig a trench six or eight inches in depth, and twelve to fourteen wide, It will make a rume and stitch a pillow slip on to the facing at the same time.

As the plants grow the soil should be gradually drawn up to them; and any surplus or weak leaves should be removed. Let it be remembered that with a moist, rich soil and careful attention, the celery crop is as certain as any other; but there is no other that will so markedly show the effects of neglect and ball treatment. Curing Diseased Trees. FEEDING DISEASED PEACH TREES.

Plenty of the right kind of food not only prevents disease in trees, but often belos towards recovery. For the care helps towards recovery. For the cure of the "yellows" in peach trees, Prof Goessmann recommends the application of from three to four pounds of muriate of potash, applied in a radius of eight feet, but not within a foot of the trunk. This is for trees of from six to eight years' growth. It is well to mulch the ground first, and apply the fertilizer on the mulching, so as to distribute it. He is under the impression that the chloride of the muriate of potash exerts a specific effects in destroying the fun gus, if this is not so, wood ashes will be as good as the muriate. He would always give complete plant food; be tween blooming and fruit-forming the nitrates and phosphates are needed It is well to supply an excess, that the plant may accomodate itself to what it needs. The reputation of wood ashes as a fertilizer rests on the same basis as that of barnyard manure; it is a complete but not a sufficient fertilizer The observations, of which an account has been given, afford suggestions rather than proofs. Not one essential element can supercode another. This is not a matter of opinion, but of thousands of analyses.

WASHING FRUIT TREES .- There are insects common to all trees, and it is only by constant care that we can get satisfaction from our trees. Or the pear and apple there is a scale insect which attaches itself to the bark and injures the tree if allowed to remain. It is known that any greasy matter is death to insects. Thus there are many compounds of this nature used for washing trees. Kerosene oil for hard wood has been used with success by many persons, but it must not get on the foliage. One form of wash is made by adding one pound of whale oil soap to three gallons of warm water, stirring well and applying with stiff broom or brush. The trank should be rubbed thoroughly and hard, to remove as much as possible of lose bark, so that the liquid may teach every part of the surface. Another good wash is weak lye from wood ashes. A third wash is lye from wood ashes. A third wash is made by adding two quarts of soft water readily combined by stirring, and should be applied like the whate oil application. The best results are obtained by wishing the tree about three times during the season, applying the limit in March or April, the second the first in March or April, the second in June and the last in August. The insects as well as moss, will be effect tually removed, leaving the back in a fine healthy condition.
