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Fishing With Outlines not Unlawful.

We publish below the opinion of the Court delivered in the case of Commonwealth vs. David Hollingshead, B. F. Dolman prosecutor, for illegal fishing. The verdict rendered by the jury found Mr. Hollingshead guilty. A motion for arrest of judgment was made by Mr. Hollingshead and the hearing took place on January 18th, last. The following is the Judge's decision in the matter:

Commonwealth against David Hollingshead. Motion in arrest of Judgment.

OPINION OF THE COURT.

The first count in the indictment charges that the defendant "did unlawfully and wilfully, in the waters of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, to wit: a stream of water called the Susquehanna river; place a permanently set means of taking fish, by then and there anchoring in the bottom of said stream a certain device, commonly called an outline, contrary to the act of Assembly."

The jury have found the defendant guilty. Reasons in arrest of judgment have been filed: First, That the count charges no offense under the law; Second, That it does not set forth the kind or character of the permanent set means of taking fish, or in what manner it is used, or how, or in what manner it is attached to the bottom of the stream.

The indictment was intended to be for the violation of the 22d section of the Act of June 3, 1878, digest 3, 128, which enacts as follows: "It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to place any fish-baskets, gill-nets, pond-nets, eel-weirs, kiddies, brush or fascine nets, or any other permanent set means of taking fish, in any of the waters of this Commonwealth; any person violating the provisions of this section shall be liable to a penalty of \$35.00, and to the indictment charges that an outline anchored to the bottom of the stream is a permanent set means of taking fish, but the question still remains whether it is such a means, or is prohibited by the statute. If the Act had prohibited the placing of any permanently set means of taking fish within the waters of the Commonwealth, without more, the question in each case of an alleged violation of the law would have been whether the device employed was of that character; but here the words "any other permanent set means of taking fish" are preceded by several specifically mentioned methods of taking fish, which methods are declared to be unlawful. It is a well established rule of construction, that if general words follow an enumeration of particular acts, they apply only to cases of a like kind with those enumerated. [Cites authorities.] Many instances might be given of the application of this rule; a reference to two or three, however, will suffice for illustration. Where a statute employed the words, "wherry, lighter, or other craft," the word "craft" was held not to include a steaming-boat; been, although a steaming-boat is a "craft," yet it is not the same class of a wherry or lighter. In construing a statute which enacted that no "tradesman, artificer, or other person whatsoever" should exercise his ordinary calling on the Lord's day, it was held that the phrase "other person" did not include a farmer, who was not a person of like denomination with the persons particularly mentioned. [Cites authorities.]
