A New Postal Decision.

By a very recent decision of the Postmaster General, only first-class mail matter -letters and postal cards-can be "forwarded free of postage in the mails, from the post-office, upon the request of the parties to whom such matter is addressed, It has been the custom, heretofore, of the post-office department to allow second. third and fourth class matter also to be "forwarded" free, but now it can only be done by again prepaying the original amount of postage, which postage must be be forwarded by the parties to whom it is

#### Fire Escapes.

The calamity that occurred a few weeks ago at the Newhall House in Milwaukee, resulting in the loss of nearly one hundred lives, coupled with other disasters of a simcape should be furnished at every building in which human beings work or live. In New York city every structure of a certain height is compelled by law to be provided with efficient means of escape for inmates in case of fire. The practical benefit of this provision has been proved over and over again, and even where no such law exists it would be a wise procedure on the part of all to provide their houses or other buildings with such appliances.

We publish below the opinion of the Court delivered in the case of Common wealth vs. David Hollingshead, B. F. Dolman prosecutor, for illegal fishing. The verdict rendered by the jury found Mr. Hollingshead guilty. A motion for arrest of judgment was made by Mr. H's counsel and the hearing took place on January 13th, last. The following is the Judge's decision in the matter:

Commonwealth against David Hollingshead Motion in arrest of Judgment.

OPINION OF THE COURT.

The first count in the indictment charges that the defendant "did unlawfully and willfully, in the waters of the Common wealth of Pennsylvania, to wit: a stream of water called the Susquehanna river; place a permanently set means of taking fish, by then and there anchoring in the bottom of said stream a certain device. commonly called an outline, contrary to the act of Assembly."

The jury have found the defendant guilty. Reasons in arrest of judgment have been filed : First, That the count charges no offense under the law : Second. That it does not set forth the kind or character of the permanent set means of taking fish, nor de fine what an outline is, or how, or in what nanner it is such means.

The indictment was intended to be for he violation of the 22d section of the Act f June 3, 1878, digest 2, 128, which enacts s follows: "It shall not be lawful for any erson or persons to place any fish-baskets, ill-nets, pond-nets, eel-weirs, kiddles, rush or fascine nets, or any other permanently set means of taking fish, in any of Columbia county, February 8th, 1883, by he waters of this Commonwealth; any Rev.
