DEATH OF JUDGE SHARSWOOD.

Ex-Chief Justice George Sharswood died at his residence in Philadelphia on Monday morning last, aged 73 years. He graduated with distinguish ed honors at the University of Pennsylvania, at eighteen, and was admitted to the Bar in 1831. At twentysix he was elected a member of the Legislature, and was appointed a Judge for Philadelphia at thirty-five. In 1850 he was chosen Professor of Law in the University, and in 1851 elected Judge under the new constitution, which position he held until 1868 when he was elected by the Democratie party to the Supreme Bench. He became Chief Justice in 1878 and continued as such until last December when his term expired. His ability at grasping a subtle legal point, and his ogical reasoning made him one of the ablest jurists of the State. 
