On October 1st the Postoffice Department will substitute a new general lock for those now in use. The new lock, which is made of corrugated steel, is lighter, stronger, and safer than that now in use, and is manufactured by the Smith & Egge Lock Company, of Connecticut. For several months a number of clerks in the mail equipment division of the Postoflice Department have been testing the new locks and keys, and distributing them throughout the country. Fifty thousand keys were sent out to postmasters and other persons authorized to hold them, in separate registered letters, and the efficiency of the registry system is shown by the fact that they were all properly delivered. When the receipts for the keys had been returned, 200,000 were distributed among the heads of star routes, the termini of railway routes, and depositories. The work has just been completed and the new lock will go into use October 1st. The change in mail locks is made but once in
