But to describe all the dark ways and vain tricks of this class would b impossible. No one knows them all, unless he has been through the same mill himself, and then he wont tell. Let us follow our subject for a while. Suppose that success crowns his efforts and the goal of his ambition is reached. He ascends the throne that the

people by their inactivity have permit-ted him to capture, and for a time he rules supreme. His word is law among his benchmen, and in overy quarter b has his aids who are always ready to do his bidding. Thus enthroned he exerts great influence, and little by little he reaches out beyond his own proper sphere, not satisfied with the one position he holds, and begins to lay his plans for putting his own tools into other offices, so that when the time comes for him to seek a renomination he will have trusty friends around him on whose support he can rely.

But his day is over, and gradually sinks from sight and memory until he is entirely lost in oblivion. His place may be taken by another of the same stripe, but if so, the old story is repeat ed, and its several chapters are headed respectively: Success, Power, Public Dissatisfaction, Defeat, Oblivion. This is no fancy sketch. Every


