The Fishingereck Railroad.

If the project of a railroad starting Bloomsburg and following the creek to the North Mountain is ever going to amount to anything now is the time to push it Engineer corps are engaged in running lines for other roads that will tap this retion, and the first road through will have an undoubted advantage. Should the proposed road from Milton to Shickshinny be constructed it will divert a large amoun of trade from Bloomsburg, and take it to those two towns, thus virtually cutting off the county seat from the commerce of the upper end of the county. As it is to the interest of all concerned to have easy communication with the county seat, the restdents of the upper end should use every effort in their power to secure the early construction of the Fishingcreek railroad. If the right of way can be secured at little expense the prospects for this road will be exceedingly bright; but if every foot of ground taken must be paid for at exorbitant rates, it will be many years before the whistle of the iron horse will awaken cchoes in the wilds of the North Mountain. A liberal spirit on the part of land owners will greatly assist the project; but a de termination to squeeze all the money possible out of the company because it is railroad corporation, regardless of the adantages to the entire community, will render the construction of the road extremely doubtful.

Mrs. Thomas Kane Killed by Her

One report says that Kane and his wife were sitting in the cabin of his canal boat at Post's whart, where he had tied up for the night. Mrs. Kane, who is about 40 years old, told her husband that a certain man had made im proper proposals to ner. Kane replied, "If the proposal is repeated,, you should treat him so." With these words, as though to illustrate his meaning, he drew his revolver, leveled it at his wife and pulled the trigger. The shot took effect in the pit of he woman's stomach. Another report is that Kane's son-in-law

and a young woman were in the cabin with them, and in response to a remark made by the son-in-law to the young woman, Kane pulled a revolver from under the bed and said to her jokingly, that if he attempted what he said he would, she should shoot him, and while handling the revolver it went off accidentally and shot Mrs. Kane. SURVEYORS AT WORK BETWEEN MILTON AND STREET,

A corps of fourteen engineers and sur veyors, headed by Thomas Morehead of he Pennsylvania Railroad company, arrived at Shickshinny Wednesday marning and commenced operations surveying the route of the railroad which is to be built from Shickshingy to Milton, in Northum berland county. It is not known with exactitude who are the originators of the road, but it is supposed that it is to be a branch of the Pennsylvania. The new road will connect with the line of that company at Mocanaqua, crossing on the present raffroad bridge. From Shickshinny the road will run by way of Jones and Millyttle in Columbia county through to Milton, total distance of about fifty six miles. It will tap an important lumber district, open up the hitherto primeval woods of the North Mountain and undoubtedly be a great boom to that section-The surveyors commenced their work immediately upon their arrival. Although the route has been gone ever in a general way by Mr. Moorehead at a previous time, t had never been properly surveyed.
