Railroad Discrimination.

A. L. Fritz, at the last session of the Legislature, voted for the Anti-Discriminaentorcement of the constitu tion in reference to charges made open with some blunt tool; in doing so, by railroad companies in the transportation to break the glass in one side and crack of freight or passengers within the State, or coming from or going to any other state. Some time ago the Farmers' Friend or Grange Advocate published a resolution endorsing the actions of Mr. Fritz and others for supporting the bill.
