The heavy importation of potatoes continues, I2,000 sacks arriving in this port from Scotland. The prices on domestic, old, ranging from \$2 to 2 50 per bbl., foreign i 50 to 225 per sack. There is a break in the butter market to-day as was anticipated. Choice creamery selling at 20c; select dairy tubs and pails 18 to 20c. Eggs are somewhat firmer and choice stock from near-by, fresh, selling from 16 to 17c. Spring chickens, live, 25 to 33c per lb., fowls 10 to 11c. Spring chickens, dressed, 33 to 48c.
