After a few more expensive fires the authorities of this town may give the fire companies sufficient encouragement to enable them to keep up an efficient organization. There is no fire department now Everybody is the boss at a fire. The grea fault lies in the fact that the rules govern ing the department provide for rotation is the office of Chief Engineer, so that no man can fill the place but a year. The Chief Engineer should be selected solely with reference to his qualifications for the place and he should be retained in office so long as he will perform the duties. What is needed is a man who will keep up the organization, look after the property of the department and instil new interest in the firemen and in the community. The rules of the department are a part of the town laws, and impose duties upon the conneil that have seldom if ever been performed.

The town has fire plugs, and hose and sufficient apparatus, but as there is no organization, there is delay and mistakes at fires that could not occur if there was an active Chief Engineer who would occasionally call out the department and have drill.
