The Central State Normal School Building Destroyed.

The Central State Normal School building at Lock Haven, was totally destroyed by fire last Sunday afternoon. Shortly after the noonday meal, smoke was seen Issuing from a lower window and in a little while the bright flames burst from several openings and began to lick the massive walls. at the time the slarm was sounded nearly 200 papils were in their rooms and the wild est excitement ensued. A number of visitors who were in the building helped to swell the general uproar.

The pupils in both departments sought Windsor caps that are all the rage this safety in hot flight. Nearly or quite all of the bedding and furniture was also lost. The furniture of the chapel, including several musical instruments, could not be moved and was consumed with rest. shared a similar fate. Owing to the fact that the fire occurred in the daytime all the inmates escaped without serious injury. A few were bruised in the scramble to escape but none dangerously so. 


