LICENSE COURT. Court met on Monday, January 21, 1889 at 10 o'clock; President Judge Ickler and Associate Judge McHenry on the bench. After the transaction of some routine business Judge Ickler stated that he had received on Saturday remonstrances against the granting of any license, from Berwick, Lightstreet, Bloomsburg, and Millville. As R. A. Howell Esq. represented the opposition to some applications, the papers were handed to him. Col. Freeze objected to the consideration of the papers on the ground that the rules of court require remonstrances to be filed seven days before license cases which has not been done. G. E. Howell objected to them on the ground that the Supreme Court has said that general remonstrances ought not to be considered. R. Buckingham and J. H. Maize also objected to the filing of the papers. After examining the papers, Mr. Howell handed them back to the court, saying that he would present them at the argument, to show popular sentiment.

Owing to the non-arrival of Associate Judge Murphy, the license cases were postponed until 1:30 p. m. Court convened at 1:30, Judges Ickler and McHenry on the bench, Judge Murphy being detained by sickness.

S. N. Walker was appointed official stenographer for the courts of the 30th District. D. R. Coffman was appointed clerk for Columbia county, and compensation fixed at \$1.50 for each day's attendance. Elijah Shutt and M. E. Cox were appointed stipendiaries, at \$1.50 per day, and they are required to keep the court room, furniture and spittoons clean.

The licenses were then taken up. On behalf of the exceptions, Mr. Howell argued that the court had no jurisdiction to grant licenses at this time, because the Act of 1875 fixes as the first and second terms of court in each year, as the time for granting licenses, and the Act of 1887 does not repeal the Act of 1875. He contended that the provision in the Act of 1887 providing that the court may fix a time by standing rule or order, means only that the court may fix a time within the period fixed by the Act of 1875, to wit, at the first or second term of the year. He also contended that the form of the advertisement in the newspapers were insufficient, in not showing the residence of the applicants with sufficient accuracy. He asked that the court would make an order permitting a copy of the exceptions to be filed in any case.

To the Hon. E. R. Ickler, President Judge of Columbia County: Your petitioners, ladies of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Columbia county, being convinced that the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, is productive of evil, and only evil; and whereas, drunkenness amongst the young men of our county is evidently on the increase, in consequence of the lack of necessary legal restraint, and whereas, the laws of the United States have for its foundation the Divine law, and that law demands drunkenness, therefore be it resolved, that we respectfully pray your Honor to grant no licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, in the aforesaid county, in which you have been elected chief vindicator of the law."

"The W. C. T. U. of Lightstreet, in the county of Columbia, to the Honorable Judges of the Court of said county: Your petitioners are an organization of women engaged in christian and philanthropic work for the suppression of the evils of intemperance. In the name of God and Home we do hereby petition you that you grant no license in Columbia county in the aforesaid county, in which you have been elected chief vindicator of the law."

"To the Hon. E. R. Ickler, President Judge of Columbia and Montour counties: With a solemn realization of the responsibility resting upon us as mothers, wives and sisters, we the members of the W. C. T. U. of Millville, Col. Co. Penn., come before you as humble supplicants asking your aid in helping to meet the great evil, footprints be found on almost every threshold. We appeal to you as a neighbor whom we found ever kind and ready to assist us; as a schoolmate whose warm sympathy has ever been with us, and as a friend upon whom we feel we can depend for assistance we so sadly need. It is not necessary for us to picture the evils of intemperance, for, like you, we have seen heartbreakers made wretched, fond hopes blighted, intellects buried in oblivion, and the reeling staggering forms of God's image have led us to exclaim "A direful pestilence is in the land!" We do therefore most earnestly entreat and implore you to be more cautious in the granting of licenses to sell intoxicants than has been done heretofore; and use your influence and authority at all times against a business which is so wrong in principle, unchristian in method and disastrous in results. May strength be given you by the carrying out of every good and noble purpose, is our prayer."

After Mr. Howell had read these petitions, speeches were made by Messrs. Zarr, Buckingham, Maize, Prevez, Edw. and R. Little, on behalf of applicants, and Mr. Howell closed the argument for exceptions. The Court overruled the exceptions to the jurisdiction. Judge Ickler said: "In the granting of the application, 3 Pa. C. C. R. 360, the query was suggested whether the provision of the act of 1887, requiring that sureties on the bond should be signers of the petition is still in force. We had herefore taken pains to ascertain what was the drift of the debate in the legislature on the passage of the Brooks bill, 1887, of the new liquor-law, as it is called, and which the present applicants petition this court for license. We find that section six of the bill contained a provision similar to that just mentioned but that this was thought unnecessary and was not embodied in the law.

Where there is conflict, or repugnancy, between an old and a new act of the legislature, the latter expression of the will of the people by their representatives must prevail, and the old act is therefore so far repealed as it is inconsistent with the new. In the light of this principle of construction, and considering the course of legis-

lation on this subject—the mischief and the remedy—noting that the new act is in a number of particulars different from the old—providing, for example, a different manner of publication, a different amount of bond, a different time for the hearing of applications—a difference that has been thoroughly discussed in the arguments of counsel—we are constrained to regard the old law abrogated in all points relating to the manner of publication, the amount of bond, and the time for the hearing of applications, and to hold also that the petition (so far as our attention has been called to them) are sufficient, within the letter of the act of 1887, though whether any applicant shall have granted to him the prayer of his petition will be decided upon the hearing of this application.
