the news of the insult to our natispal banner was flashed along the wires on the 12th day of April, 1861. Excitement unparalleled in the history of our nation pervaded every city and hamlet, every mansion and hovel, and almost every heart in the North. The farmer stopped his plow in the furrow. the merchant dropped his yard stick upon the counter, the blacksmith his hemmer upon the anvil, the carpenter his plane upon the bench, and all with one accord listened in breathless silence to catch every word of the startling news. For the first time in our history the Stars and Strines were trail. ed in the dust by traitors. The indignation of a loyal people at that hour cannot be described. Party lines, for the time being, were blotted out and with one sentiment the men of all political parties rallied around the flag. At the first call of the President for 75,000 men 300,000 brave men and true responded and pledged themselves to pro tect their country. Battle after battle was fought with varied results. At times the most sauguine and patriotic men of the nation felt that the life or death of our Republic hung on the scale, nearly equally balanced. But the Goddess of Liberty watched over our republic and guided its statesmen in council and its generals in

battle and victory was the result. The Union army met their enemies with, "Liberty and Union" streaming upon their Mountain, and in front of the gates of Atanta and upon the plains of Gettysburg and wherever they went, and the armies of treason and rebellion were forced to give way before the invincible armies of the porth. Thus it went on until the host marched through the sandy pine forests of central and southern Georgia, knocking at and opening the gates of Savannah and killed in this State.-Ex. linking their arms with the fleet of the sea, and while they were thus engaged another part of the army was looking up the interests at Richmond. This winter has been a mercifully open one, so that the suffering from exposure has not been as great as was expected. But, oh! the starving thousands! Parents are committing suicide rather than see their little ones starve, and men spend their last cash for arsenic, that they may spare themselves the prolouged pangs of death from hunger.-

MENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION fution.
Joint resolution proposing an amendment to be Constitution of this Common wealth:
SECTION 1. He it resolved by the Senate and house of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That he following amendment is proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, a accordance with the Eighteenth Article thereof:

There shall be an additional article to said Con sitution to be designated as Article XIX, as fol ARTICLE XIX.

ARTICLE XIX.

The manufacture, sale, or keeping for sale of intoxicating figuor, to be used as a beverage, is hereby prohibited, and any riolation of this prohibition shall be a misameanor, punishable as shall be promised by law.

The manufacture sale, or keeping for sale of intoxicating figuor for other purposes than as a beverage may be allowed in such manuer only as may be prescribed by law. The General Assembly shall, at the first session succeeding the adoption of this article of the Constitution, chart laws with indequate penalties for its enforcement.
