#### WASHINGTON LETTER.

From our regular correspondent. Washington, Nov. 4, 1889. Civil Service Commissioner Thompson's friends indignantly deny the statement charging him with having as-sisted in collecting campaign contributions for the democratic National com mittee in 1888 from the clerks in the Treasury department while he was Assistant Secretary of that Department. Mr. Youman, who was chief clerk of the Treasury at the time, makes the following statement, which is corrob-orated by a number of other officials, some of them republicans:

During the incumbency of Mr. Thompson as Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, I was Chief Clerk and Superintendent of the Treasury building, and charged with the enforcemen of all orders. I remember distinctly during the campaign of 1888 one of my subordinates, with-out, my knowedge, had collected or received from the employes some seventy five dollars and informed me of it, and wished to turn the money over to me to be forwarded to the democratic committee I declined to receive 1t, and at once reported the fact to Assistant Secretary Thompson, who distinctly and emphatically told me that such act was illegal and must not be permitted in the department, and directed me to send for this subordinate and order him to return the money to the persons from whom he had received it, upon pain of dismissal (which I did and the money was so returned), and further to stop all that kind of work in the department.

This silly charge was brought against Mr. Thompson by republicans because he has taken steps to prosecute members of a Virginia republican club of this city for collecting money from Government employes for the Mahone campaign fund.

Ex-Secretary Bayard will be married in this city next Thursday, to Miss Clymer. This marriage has been reported as about to take place at least a half dozen times during the last year. The anouncement is official, as your correspondent has one of the few cards issued.

A committee of negro preachers call ed on Mr. Harrison last week and en-deavored to get him to commit himself to the absurd scheme, proposed by the recent convention of negro Baptists held at Indianapolis, of asking Congress to appropriate \$50,000,000 to aid the negroes of the South in emigrating to the west. The same committe afterwards called on the Attorney General and presented a long string of alleged political outrages at the South. From all that can be learned they did not receive much consolation from either of the gentlemen visited. They only got some very indefinite and diplomatic

L. B. Prince, the Governor of New Mexico, makes a strong showing in his annual report to the Secretary the Interior, in favor of the admission of that Territory as a state. It is expected that the democrats in Congress will make a determined fight during the coming session for the admission of New Mexico and Idaho.

The Government directors of the Union Pacific railroad, in their annua report, say that the interests of the United States demand early action by Congress to secure the payment by this company of its indebtedness to the Government. They indorse the (Outhwaite) bill, which was pending when the last Congress adjourned. It re-mains to be seen whether the millionaire lobby will be successful in again defeating this much needed legislation during the coming Congress. Representative Outhwaite proposes to re-introduce the same bill as soon as Congress meets, and to use his utmost endeaver to push it through the House. There is little doubt of its being pass ed by the House, but the danger lies in the Senate, which has always been inclined, for obvious reasons, to be extremely lenient in its dealings with

the Pacific railroads. It behooves us, then, to look back with thankful hearts over the past year and bless. God for His mercyin vouching to this land enduringpeace, to our people freedom from pestilence and famine, to our husbandmen abundant harvests and to them that labor a recompense for their toil. "Now, therefore, I, Benjamin Harri-

son, President of the United States of America, do excestly recommend that Thursday, the 28th day of this month of November, he set apart as a day of national thanksgiving and prayer, and that the people of our country, c asing from the cares and labo s of their work-ing day, shall a semble in their respec-tive places of worship and give thanks to God, who has prespered us on our way and made our paths the paths of peace, beseching Him to bless the day to our present and future good, making it truly ne of thanksgiving for each reunited home circle as for the nation at large.




