WASHINGTON LETTER.

Washington, D. C. Feb. 10, 1890.
Ex-Speakers Carlisle and Randall have ably presented their case in the minority report on the code of Rules, which Mr. Carlisle by his parliamentary adroitness compelled the republican majority of the House committee on Rules to report much sooner than they had intended. It says of the clause in the proposed Rules authorizing the the proposed Rules authorizing the Speaker to count members not voting to make a quorum: "This is the most radical, and in our opinion, the most dangerous innovation proposed by the majority. If agreed to the personal and property rights of the citizens, pro-tected heretofore by laws enacted by a majority, may be impaired or des-troyed by the votes of a more fraction of the members of Congress. In the asme way enormous sums of money may be appropriated from the public treasury for the most unconstitutional and improper purposes. Any rule or practice which enables the Speaker or the clerk to pass bills by counting members present and not voting will inevitably result in destroying the confidence of the people in the integrity of legislation.

integrity of legislation.

The rules were called up in the House to day and nothing else is to be done until they are disposed of. Just when that will be cannot be stated yet. The republicans seem inclined to try to rush them through and to have a final vote taken not later than Wednesday, but this programme will be vigor-ously resisted by the democrats, who insist upon ample time being given for a full and free discussion. They have taken this stand, not because they ex-pect to defeat the adoption of the Rules but that they may have an op-portunity, through the medium of speeches, to show up every flaw in specches, to show up every flaw in them, so that the country may place the responsibility where it belongs. The imperative need of more public

buildings in Washington has been much talked of in both ends of the Capital, since Senator Morrill brought out the fact that \$121,700 a year was being paid by the Government for rents in this city, and that owing to the overcrowded condition of the Government buildings the amount was continuously increasing. The senti-ment in Congress seems to be in tavor of erecting the buildings necessary to carry on the business of the Government, and it is probable that early action will be taken in the matter. This is particularly necessary in the case of the Government printing office, a ramshacklety, unhealthy old rat-trap which will some day fall down and kill several hundred of its sardine-packed occupants if it is not replaced by a new building.

The republicans in Congress are long ways from being a happy family just now. Senator Edmunds threatens to resign from the Senate Committee on Foreign affairs because a resolution of his was voted down in executive session, while senator Sherman, chairman "let him go" On the House side ther are eceans of trouble. Speaker Reed is hopping mad because the republican caucus amended his code of Rules by adding a clause making pension legislation privileged at all times, and he has intimated to Mr. Carlisle through a third party, that if a democrat will move to strike out this clause enough blicans would vote with him to de

The hearings in the Ohio ballot-box forgeries still go merrily on, but it is expected that this week will end them. What ever the committee may do, the impartial public has convicted Foraker and Halstead of trying to destroy a man's good name with a paper which they know to be forced.

Belief that the new Rules are to be lopted by the House has brought a worm of lobbyists of all descriptions to Washington in the hope of getting a part of the spoils. This was the way the matter strikes Representative Crisp, of Georgia, one the most clear-headed men in the House: "When you consider the House: "When you consider the propositions for immense expenditures of public money that are being urged upon this Congress, and that these Rules make the way clear for them, you do not have to be a prophet to see that the money asked for by Congress is apt to overbalance that held at the Treasury."

The democrats are taking the liminary steps towards a winning Congressional campaign this year. Representative Flower, of New York, has been elected temporary chairman, and Representative McRea, of Arkansas, temporary secretary of the Congress ional campaign committee. Great pres-sure is being brought to bear on Senator Gorman to accept the permanent chairmanship of this committee.

Bob Ingersoll who is here, indorses Speaker Reed, but then it must be reembered that Ingersoll, like Reed does not believe in a hereafter.

The Oregon Flood.

GREAT LOSS FROM THE OVERFLOW IN THE

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 11.—The greatest loss in Benton county by the recent flood occured in the Alsea Valley. The Alsea river overflowed its banks, and in many places the water was several feet higher than ever before known. Several head of stock were drowned, and much fencing was washed away. The mountain sides in many places moved down in the bottom— some of the slides being 500 feet square and so deep that in some instances large trees were carried hundreds of yards downward, and are now standing erect. In other cases trees have been broken off and piled up with earth fifty feet deep, forming a dam in the

The only death reported in Benton ounty, occured near Alsea Bay early Monday morning. A large slide came down the mountain side, burying Robert Barcly's residence and imprisoning Barcly, two children, and Robert Brown. The father and two children were extricated after some difficulty, but Brown was found dead, having been crushed by heavy timber. A barn near by was wrecked and ten head of stock killed.
