Peter Cooper was well advertised by that noble benefac tion, the Institute which bears his honored name. George Peabody was advertised on two continents by his splendid gifts to the city of London. Girard, Smithson, Cornell, Lick, Childs and a score of other Americans who have used their wealth for the lasting benefit of their fellow-men have their fame based upon their benefactions. Andrew Carnegie is just now receiving considerable "advertising" for endow-ing rich libraries in Pennsylvania.

It is the credit of human nature that good examples carry the power of in-fection. One good deed, one action for the public benefit, incites others. There are charities which should be kept private, and there are others which should be made public. The men and women whose public benefac far more good in secret than will ever be credited by the recording angel to those who are swift to impute bad motives to any good action in others .-
