The Susquehanna Synod of the Lutheran Church to which the congregation of Bloomsburg belongs m t in its 28d Annual Convention at Catawissa on Wednesday May 21, continuing in session until Monday noon, May 26. This Synod covers the country along the Susquehanna river from Selinsgrove to Hazleton on the North Branch and to Jersey shore on the West Branch. This is the least of six Synods in the State, and this is by no m ans a small body. There are forty-three ministers enrolled, all of whom wer; present, excepting one, and each with a delegate, and these togetaer with the visiting ministers made a body of about one hundred. This much of an addition made to the little borough of Catawissa so suddenly, added no little life to the town for the time being. It was found necessary to increase the surly of chickens but not of the police force.

Great progress was reported from every pastorate not only in addition to membership but increase of benevolence. Among the important business done was the following: Aid was granted nine young men in preparation for the ministry, some at Selinsgrove, at Gettysburg and Wittenberg. Four were ordained as ministers in the presence of a large andience,

The various representatives of the Boards showed the Home and Foreign work in exceptionally good condition. The largesst college in the church is in Guntur India, with 378 students and a corps of 19 professors. A new coilege building is being erected at a cost \$25000 to accommodate 500 students. The work in Africa is the most hopeful of any mission of any denomination operating in the dark continent. Over 400 acres are being farmed at the mission and tons of coffee and rice exported every

For church building the church has given \$16,000 more during the last Bicunium than during any preceding blennium in its history.

Very strict resolutions on temperance and the Sabbath were passed pledging the Synod to unswerving opposition to liquor traffic by voice and rote. The desecration of the Sabbath was deplored and the Sunday Newspaper denounced as an agency of evil. All labor should be restricted to works of necessity and mercy, and the Law of God faithfully preached on these points. Ways were introduced for the enlargement of the work. Five hundred dollars a year for two years were pledged to the Northumberland church struggling under a galling debt. Five clerical and five lay delegates were

lected to the General Synod meeting in Lebanon Pa., next May. The pulpits of Catawissa and adjoining towns were supplied by members of the Synod. Revs. Manhart and Dr. Scholl of Baltimore supplied the Lutheran pulpit of this place. The Synod voted to hold its next Annual meeting in South Williamsport in June 1891. During the meeting of the Synod new organization was formed to be called "The Young Peoples' Alliance" which is similar to the Christian Endeavor, adding the literary and Social features. It will be the Christian endeavor Lutheranized as Methodists Eoworthize it. The utmost good feeling prevailed during the Synod, and the reaching influence of the Synod will ever be felt. The Holy Sacrament was observed on Sabbath morning, by the Synod first, followed by the people. In all respects the Lutneran church in Catawissa is one of the handsomest in the Bynod and the congregation and pastor deserve much praise for their taste and liber-


