POULTRY NOTES.

No. 5.

Coal oil can be put to so many uses in the poultry yard that it should be called the poultryman's friend.

Its uses are varied and many, and the good results obtained from its proper use are not esteemed as highly as they should be, merely because not rightly under-

We give below some of the uses it can be put to and would advise its use mo e

pointed to report the following resolu-As a lice exterm nator it has no equal, Use it freely in cracks and crevices, in the corner of nest boxes, on roosting poles, and on the body of fowls by mixing with lard.

> For scaly legs mix with jard and apply once or twice a week for two or three

> For roup mix as above and apply to the head freely, at the same time give a dose or two internally of the same.

As a preventative and cure for cholera it can not be overestimated; for firs stages and as a preventative use by soaking wheat or corn in it and feed once or twice a week. As a cure after the fowl refuses to eat put it on some bread and force it down them, but care should be taken not to give too much as the result will be as fatal as cholera itself. A piece the size of the end of your thumb given twice a day would be sufficient.

I have used it as a preventative of gaps with very good results Mix with lard and add a few drops of crude carbolic seid. Apply to the tops of the chicks head when taken from the nest. The application should be made every week for three or four weeks.

No one who pretends to keep poultry should fail to use it freely and often, for I know that the result from it will be very satisfactory.
