Special meeting of Council held all members present.

Mr. Rhodes made motion to reconsider the action taken at last meeting in reference to Oak Grove Park. Motion not seconded.

Dr. Willits moved that the proposition of the Electric Light and Power Co. to light the town be accepted at the price submitted by them at meeting of Council on May 28, 1891. Mr. White seconded the motion. Yeas, Willits, White, Gorrey, Furman and Harman—5; nays, Allen and Rhodes—2. President declared the motion carried.

Mr. Gorrey moved that the tax rate for the year 1891 be fixed at twelve mills, seconded by Dr. Willits. Yeas, Willits, White, Gorrey, Furman and Harman—5; nays, Allen and Rhodes—2. President declared motion carried.

Council sitting as a board of revision fixed the boundary line for the built up portion as follows: Beginning at a point on the Fishingcreek in lands of estate of Mathias Shaffer, thence along said creek to land of the estate of L. B. Rupert, thence southwardly to south line of L. B. Rupert estate—thence embracing the Fair Grounds, Carpet works and following B. & S. R. R. to Belt Line, following Belt Line to Irondale railroad—thence to the Pennsylvania Canal, following Pennsylvania Canal eastwardly to lands of Land Improvement Company; following various courses of Land Improvement Company to the land of McKelvy and Neal at Fifth street along McKelvy and Neal land to extension of Third street; eastwardly along Third street to lands of Land Improvement Company; northwardly along said land to and including Normal School grounds—thence down the Light Street road to lands of Joshua Fetterman, thence along lands of D. W. Armstrong, W. J. Keller, Michael Casey, Philip Eyer estate and A. Z. Schoch, thence to Iron street road, thence to Mathias Shaffer estate lands the place of beginning. All other lots and small parcels of lands not within these limits, and not used strictly for farming purposes shall be rated as suburban.

Upon motion of Gorrey and Allen the furnace property of the Bloomsburg Iron Co. should be rated as suburban. Upon motion of Furman and Willits the furnace property of Wm. Neal and Sons should be rated as suburban.

Date of appeals was fixed for Thursday, June 25th 1891 between the hours of two and six p. m.

S. W. Shutt and M. C. Woodward were placed in nomination upon serving tax notices, ballot was as follows: For Woodward; Willits, White, Allen, Harman—4. For Shutt; Furman, Gorrey, Rhodes—3.

Upon motion of Willits and Gorrey the President was authorized to enter into a contract with the Land Improvement Company in the matter of leasing Oak Grove Park.

Upon motion the Commissioner was instructed to lay a stone pavement on the improved portion fronting property of Petriken and Billmeyer, corner of East and Second street, and make necessary repairs to the board walk along same, and charge the costs together with twenty per centum against the owners of the property.

A Counterfeiter Arrested.

At an early hour Sunday morning secret service agents arrested Reuben Palmer, near Troy, Penna. Palmer, who is a horse dealer, and travels over the state, disposing of his stock, is charged with passing counterfeit money. For some time the country in the vicinity of Elmira, Hornellsville and Troy has been flooded with spurious coin, and recent developments led the detectives to believe that Palmer was at the bottom of it. It was finally traced to him, and his arrest quickly followed.

It has transpired that he was an assistant to the famous James Holden, a notorious counterfeiter, who has served several terms in the penitentiary, and was arrested in New York on Saturday by the secret service agents, who are now on their way to Pittsburg where his prisoner, Palmer was brought before Commissioner Mix, of Towanda, and in default of \$3000 bail was committed to the Bradford county prison. The search of Palmer's premises brought to light a complete counterfeiter's outfit.
