



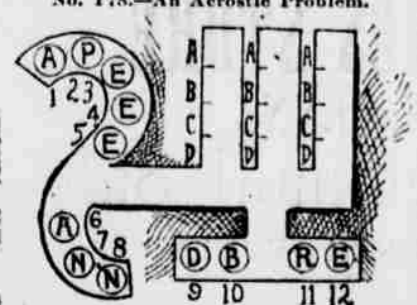

Meeting of Democratic Executive Committee.

There was a meeting of the State Executive Committee at the old democratic headquarters, No. 1416 South Penn Square, Philadelphia, last Thursday. State Chairman Kerr had great cause for gratification over the excellent attendance given the meeting of the Democratic State executive committee.

HARRISBURG AND SEPTEMBER 3. There was first of all a general conference and interchange of opinion, and this was followed by a secret session of the executive committee, at which it was decided to hold the next State Convention at Harrisburg, and Thursday, September 3, was agreed upon as the day and date.

CONGRESSMEN INDORSE KERR. Seven of the ten Democratic Congressmen in the Pennsylvania delegation were among those taking part in the conference. They were William McAleer, of the old Third district; Edwin Hallowell, the Willow Grove farmer; William Mutchler, chief of the Tenth Legion; David B. Brunner, the Herks-Lehigh representative; S. P. Wolverton, of the Columbia-Northumberland district; Frank E. Beltzhoover, of Carlisle; and E. P. Gillespie, of New Castle, who slipped in through that triangular contest in the Twenty-fifth district.

They decided upon having a little meeting of their own and adjourning to another room adopted an agreement to support and indorse Chairman Kerr for Chief Clerk of the incoming Federal House of Representatives.

SOME INTERESTED PARTICIPANTS. Among the others present and participating in the meeting were Hon. John E. Faunce, of Philadelphia; Hon. James A. Stranahan, deputy attorney general; Judge Mayer, of Lock Haven; Captain George R. Guss, West Chester; Ex Senator C. E. Vandergrift, Doylestown; Captain W. H. Barclay, Pittsburg, late Democratic candidate for secretary of internal affairs; Rembrandt Peale, Lock Haven; J. Frank Snyder, Clearfield; Captain W. F. Reiber, Bellefonte, executive clerk under Governor Pattison, Chas. R. Kurtz, A. E. Garmen and George Youngman, of the Watchman, Bellefonte; Fred Kurtz, Jr., Centre Hall Reporter; W. E. Hawley and Thomas Mullen, Pittsburg. A number of letters and telegrams were received from other prominent Democrats in the state who, not being able to be present, sent words of encouragement.

The Legislative Record. Three thousand, five hundred and fifty-two pages of the Legislative Record, containing the proceedings of the last legislature, have been issued up to date. For each page the contractor, Clarence M. Busch, of Philadelphia, receives \$4.90. At this rate the state has already spent \$17,404.80 for this publication. Twenty compositors are now at work on the Record, besides a pressman and stereotyper, two assistants, a proof reader, galley boy and foreman of the composing room. Thirty-two pages are being issued daily. Next year Mr. Busch will add over 1,000 pounds of new type to the plant so that the publication can be gotten out quicker than ever before. Twenty-eight years ago the state paid sixteen dollars a page for the publication of the Record. Lively competition has gradually brought it down to the present price.

The Delamater Sale. The personal property of ex-Senator, and late candidate for Governor, G. W. Delamater, was sold at public sale by the assignees, Messrs. Haskins & McClintock. There was a large attendance at the handsome residence on Chestnut street, lately occupied by our once distinguished, but now extinguished townsman. Many creditors expressed their disappointment when they found bare rooms and an almost empty house. Little remained of value—scarcely enough to furnish two rooms, and the whole sale at the house only amounted to about \$250, and about the same amount at the barn. The horses had been sold previously.

Indignant depositors declared that the house was gutted like the bank, and that the way things are panning out the property of the bankrupts will not more than pay the preferred judgments of \$115,000 held by the members of the family and their relatives—leaving nothing to apply on their debts of about \$1,000,000. The assignee says that what was taken from the house previously was under the \$300 allowance, of which Mr. Delamater had availed himself, and also articles claimed as personal property by others.—Meadville Messenger.

Greek Must Go. The most dangerous attack on Greek in the schools and colleges yet seen was made the other day in England at a meeting of the head masters of the Eton, Harrow, Rugby, Winchester, Westminster, Charter House, St. Paul's, Clifton and other schools—one of their usual annual or semi-annual gatherings. It was led, or in fact made, by Mr. Well-ton, the head master of Harrow. He advocated the abolition of obligatory Greek both at school and college and the substitution of science or modern languages, on two grounds.

The first was the need of adapting education to individual tastes and capacity. The second—in the interest of Greek study itself—was that the Greek language might be left in the hands of those who really loved it, and could cultivate it with success—to a sort of classical elite, in short, who would rescue it from its degraded condition as the bugaboo of dunces and sluggards. There was a good deal of discussion, pro and con, which elicited nothing very new, but Mr. Well-ton came within two votes of carrying his resolution, this adverse majority being obtained by the adhesion of two of the smaller schools.

We doubt if anything so ominous for Greek has yet occurred, for the English public schools are its stronghold today, and indeed England may be said to be its main champion. It has never struck such deep roots in education and general culture on the continent or in this country.—New York Nation.
