ORDINANCE NO. 57.
AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING HAWKING AND PEDDLING IN THE TOWN OF BLOOMSBURG.
Be it ordained and enacted by the Town Council of the Town of Bloomsburg and it is hereby enacted by authority of the same,
SECTION 1. That no hawking or peddling of meats, fish, teas, spices, fruits, vegetables or other provisions shall at any time be allowed in the Town of Bloomsburg by any one excepting citizens of the Town, and any person or persons violating this ordinance shall on conviction before the President of the Town Council forfeit and pay a fine of five dollars with costs for each offense. All ordinances or supplements thereto not in conformity with this ordinance are repealed.
