**BRIEF MENTION OF NEWS**

Happenings of the World from Pole to Pole.

TOLD IN A FEW SECONDS OF TIME.

The Developments of Each Day During the Week Caught Fresh from the Busy Wires and Carefully Edited and Condensed for Our Readers.

The Western Union denies that it will reduce cable rates between America and Europe.

Acting Secretary Nettleton has instructed the collector at New York to take steps to prevent the importation from Germany of goods produced by convict labor.

President D. H. Moffatt, of the Denver and Rio Grande railroad, has tendered his resignation because he was not in harmony with the board of directors and English stockholders.

Half of Charleston, Ark., was burned out. William H. Danley has died at Williamsport, Pa., from the sting of a honey bee, which caused paralysis.

A young man demanded food of several persons in Milford, near Cincinnati, and then killed himself.

The Weekly Argus, of San Francisco, the personal organ of Senator Leland Stanford, puts him in nomination for the presidency.

John Taylor, a carpenter, of Indianapolis, has been arrested on a charge of setting fire to seventy-five buildings in order to get work repairing them.

President Diaz of Mexico has suspended the customs duties in Chihuahua, so that food may be imported from this country to the starving people of that state.

The Brainerd party, wrecked in Lake Superior in the steam yacht *Cruiser*, was rescued in a starving condition from a cave near Chapel beach.

The proclamations for the opening of the Sac and Fox, Kickapoo and Iowa Indian reservations, in Oklahoma territory, are being prepared in the interior department.

Solicitor General Taft at Washington has authorized Marshal Walker, of Alabama, to pursue "Bob" Sims, the outlaw, in Choctaw country, with a posse of forty men.

The interior department has decided to establish a permanent government post near Fort Francis, 180 miles northwest of Duluth, on the Rainy river, to prevent the stealing of timber.

News of the arrest and sentence to exile of several leading citizens of Nicaragua is confirmed. Two of them are ex-presidents. They will be shot if they return to Nicaragua.

Miss Susan B. Anthony is authority for the statement that there is a project to build, in Rochester, N. Y., a new university, which will be coeducational for the sexes.

At New York health department chemists report result of investigations showing that certain parts of the croton water supply are greatly contaminated with putrid and obnoxious matter.

John Wood, treasurer of the building committee of the Brooklyn Tabernacle, received a complimentary dinner and testimonial from the board of trustees of the church at Cottage City, Mass.

Matthew Ryan, thought to be suffering from yellow fever, is under strict quarantine in Fordham, N. Y., while his five fever stricken companions wander about the streets.

President Hippolyte, of Hayti, is defended by United States Consul Terres, who says he is trying to be a just ruler. It is now quiet in the black republic.

George W. Vedder, of Hoosac Falls, N. Y., who was knocked down and run over by a wagon at Boston, is dead.

At New York Isidor Elbe, manufacturer of diamond jewelry at 42 Maiden Lane, has made an assignment.

The new United States revenue cutter *Galveston* has been formally placed in commission.

The Berlin Saale Zeitung says that Bismarck is aging rapidly and that he is sonolent and losing his memory.

It is said that Actor Richard Mansfield will wed Miss Beatrice Cameron, his leading lady.

At New York a policeman found a live, naked baby in an ash barrel, where it had been thrown to die.

Emin Pacha has fought a successful series of engagements with the dervishers, conquering them completely and capturing much ivory.

Mamie Roach, the Brooklyn girl who threw a can of vitriol over Charles Gerhardt, was discharged by Justice Engel.

There is trouble in the People's party of Ohio. The chairman of the executive committee is charged with treachery.

The production of cloth at Fall River has been curtailed 30,000 pieces in the past two weeks, owing to a scarcity of weavers.

Mr. I. Fleischman, lessee of the Walnut Street theater, Philadelphia, is dead.

Major McKinley opened the Ohio campaign at Niles, where he spoke to 30,000 persons and pushed the silver question forward as one of the issues of the campaign.

It is alleged that Count Herbert Bismarck has written to the Hamburger Nachrichten denouncing the interview alleged by M. de Blowitz, the Paris correspondent of the London Times, to have been held by him with Count von Munster, the German ambassador at Paris, as a fabrication, and that Count Herbert will endeavor to force von Munster into a duel.

At the Democratic district convention at Addison, N. Y., it was decided unanimously to favor Hill for governor and Charles F. Peck for lieutenant governor.

A young fellow named James Roberts has been arrested at New Washington, O., as being the Columbus Grove murderer and bank robber. Two people who saw the Columbus Grove murderer at the time he was making his escape have identified him.

The New York Herald says that President Harrison's alleged plan to confine the coinage of silver to the product of American mines may be accepted by both parties. Russian papers state that there is no fear of there being any prohibition of the export of wheat from Russia, nor will there even be a tax on its importation abroad.

Thomas S. Findlay, cashier in a wholesale shoe house and a well known club man of Brooklyn, was arrested for embezzling more than \$23,000 of his employer's money.

Mrs. Ida Florine Lederer, daughter of Richard S. Newcombe, opposes the probate of her father's will on the ground that she is an infant without a guardian.

The Farley National bank, of Montgomery, Ala., closed its doors.

**AN ACT.**

To provide for the appointment and increase the efficiency of the Commissioners of Fisheries of this Commonwealth.

SEC. 1.—Be it enacted, &c., That the Governor of the commonwealth is hereby authorized and required, upon the expiration of the terms of office of the person and persons who may hold and exercise the office of fish commissioner of this state, to appoint, subject to approval by the Senate, six competent citizens of this state to be and act as a board of fishery commissioners, no two of who shall be from the same senatorial district, and shall upon such appointment, designate which two of said persons shall receive and hold office during the term of one year; with two shall receive and hold office during the term of two years, and which two of said persons shall receive and hold office during the term of three years.

SECTION 2.—Upon the death, resignation or removal from office of any person so appointed as aforesaid, the Governor shall appoint a competent person to serve for the unexpired term of the person so dying, resigning or removed, subject to the approval by the Senate at its next meeting, if such meeting shall be before the expiration of the term of office of such appointee.

SECTION 3.—Upon the expiration of the term of office of any person so appointed and designated under the provisions of this act, their successors shall be appointed in manner aforesaid, for the term of three years, so that there shall be not more than two vacancies at any one time in such commission, and the terms of two commissioners shall expire thereafter each year.

SECTION 4.—Any person or persons appointed commissioners by virtue of this act, shall be subject to, and liable for, all the duties, provisions and obligations given and imposed by any law of this commonwealth now in force, or hereafter enacted, and referring to the duties and obligations of the Commissioners of Fisheries of this commonwealth.

SECTION 5.—Nothing herein contained shall interfere or alter the terms of office of the commissioners now acting, and they shall continue in office until the expiration of the term of which they were appointed.

SECTION 6.—In the event of the death, resignation or removal from office of any person or persons now occupying the office of fish commissioner of this commonwealth, the appointment or appointments by the Governor to supply such vacancy or vacancies in the board of fishery commissioners shall be under the provisions of this act.

SECTION 7.—All acts or part of acts inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

APPROVED—The 15th day of April, A. D. 1891.
