Sunbury's Disastrous Fire.

The most disastrous fire known in the history of Sunbury since the burning of the Oppenheimer block on Market street occurred last Sunday evening, when the large planing mill owned by Ira Clement went up in flames, causing a loss of \$25,000. It is not definitely known how the fire originated, but a suspicion prevails that during the heavy storm which swept over the city in the afternoon lightning struck the wires attached to the mill and was conveyed to the interior. When once fairly started nothing could save it. Several persons who were passing about 8:30 o'clock noticed smoke issuing from the front of the building.

The alarm was sounded, and although the fire companies were quick to respond, the flames had penetrated the shed filled with shavings and the interior was all ablaze. The mill is located at the corner of Race and Third streets, and after finding that it was useless in trying to save the mill the firemen turned their attention to the nearby dwellings and succeeded in keeping the leaping flames from doing any damage. About 3,000 people witnessed the burning of the mill, and the vicinity of Race and Third streets was crowded until ten o'clock. The mill was the most valuable one owned by Ira Clement.

100,000 a Year.

This is the rate at which Commissioner RAUM—still unreformed—boasts that he is increasing the list of pensioners.

In a letter to an Ohio Congressman, for campaign use with the professional pension-hunters, RAUM says that there are before him "a grand total of 929,426 pending claims." And he has "set the office the task of issuing 350,000 certificates during the present fiscal year, which will be an increase of 100,000 over the work of the last fiscal year, and the work of the fiscal year just closed (June 30th) showed an increase of nearly one hundred thousand certificates over any previous year."

Is not this a beautiful outlook for the Treasury and the taxpayers?

More than a quarter of a century after the close of the war, and fifteen years after GRANT and GARFIELD said the list of pensioners had reached its maximum, there are nearly a million claims pending—391,482 more than the total number of pensioners in 1890!

And RAUM is rushing them through at the rate of 350,000 a year. As 538,000 pensioners cost last year \$124,500,000, a simple sum will show the trustworthiness of RAUM's campaign assurance that the addition of 350,000 more names will not increase the cost above the \$133,173,000 appropriated.
