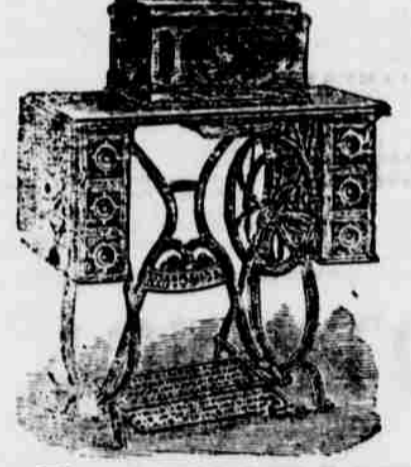

SPURGEON IS DEAD.

He Passed Away at Mentone on Sunday at the Age of Fifty-eight.

LONDON, Feb. 1.—Rev. Charles H. Spurgeon, pastor of the Tabernacle, died at Mentone yesterday, aged fifty-eight years.

Mr. Spurgeon was born at Kelvedon, Essex, on June 19, 1834. His father and grandfather were ministers in the Independent denomination. At the age of sixteen he became an usher at Newmarket and later at Cambridge. At the latter place he connected himself with a lay preacher's organization and became pastor of a small Baptist congregation at Waterbury. He was then eighteen years old. He was called to the New Park Street Baptist Chapel, in Southwark, London, in 1853, and there the wonderful powers of the preacher were first developed. Crowds flocked to his place of worship, at prayer meetings and Sunday services, to such a degree that the congregation was forced to move to larger quarters at Exeter Hall. But even the latter place was inadequate to the demands of the people who thronged to listen to his magic words, and another move was made to Surrey Hall. In 1865 his congregation erected a new chapel in Newtoning with a seating capacity of 9,000.

THE JAMESBURG BANK.

Stockholders Agree to Make Good Cashier Hill's Default.

JAMESBURG, N. J., Jan. 28.—The stockholders of the Jamesburg Bank, which was victimized to the extent of \$50,000 by T. Wilton Hill, deceased, decided yesterday to pay fifty per cent. of the \$15,000 assessment levied to make good the shortage. The balance they agreed to make good today, which will restore the capital stock to \$75,000 and permit the bank to resume on a solid basis.

Dr. Applegate, the physician who attended Hill, gave a certificate that the cashier's death was from natural causes, and has made affidavit that the certificate was true. This has put a stop to the rumor that Hill committed suicide by taking poison, and the body will not be exhumed.

"Hill died from remorse and worry over his affairs," the doctor said. "He frequently spoke of the bank just before he died."

MCCARTHY DEFEATS CALLAGHAN.

Fourteen Rounds Fought Before 3,000 People at New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 28.—Cal McCarthy, of Jersey City, and Tom Callaghan fought one of the best contests witnessed here for some time last night. The fight took place before the Olympic Club, in the presence of 3,000 people.

In the fourteenth round McCarthy was declared the winner.

The match was for a purse of \$3,000. It was entered into by the men with the idea of bringing off a match between George Dixon and the victor.

The winner will now be matched with George Dixon for the world's championship. The battle will likely take place in the Olympic Club arena some time next October. The purse will be \$5,000 and a side bet of \$5,000.

Arrested for Shooting Her Daughter.

ATLANTIC CITY, Feb. 2.—Mrs. Emma Warrick, who on Thursday night last shot her nineteen-year-old daughter, Laura, in their home at this place, was arrested yesterday by order of Prosecutor Thompson on a charge of assault with intent to kill. It was at first supposed that Mrs. Warrick was insane.

The ball struck the girl in the face near the nose, and has not been extracted. The wound is not likely to prove fatal, but the girl is in danger of losing the sight of both eyes. Mrs. Warrick has been in ill health for several months.

County Prosecutor Thompson learned that Mrs. Warrick had purchased the pistol and cartridges a short time before the shooting. The defendant is the wife of Capt. Warrick, who is commander of a vessel now moored at Philadelphia. Mrs. Warrick waived examination to await the action of the Grand Jury.

A Judge Dies on the Bench.

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Jan. 27.—Supreme Court Justice Knapp, of New Jersey, was seized with a fit of apoplexy while on the bench in this city yesterday afternoon and died within a few minutes.

At the time of his death he was scoring the grand jury for its failure to indict Sigfried Cronheim of Hoboken for persistent violation of the Sunday laws.

Manning M. Knapp was born in Bergen county in 1823. He graduated from Rutgers College and was admitted to the bar in 1846. In 1850 he was made a counselor at law. January 25, 1875, he was appointed a Supreme Court Justice by Governor Bedle, being successively reappointed by Governors Ludlow and Green in 1882 and 1889 respectively.

High Water Mark Monument.

BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 2.—Thursday, June 2, is the day fixed for the dedication of the High Water Mark Monument at Gettysburg.

The President and members of his Cabinet have accepted an invitation to be present, and the governors of all States that have contributed to mark the field, veterans of the Army of the Potomac, State monument committees, members of Congress and others of distinction will be invited.

Baby McKee Sold for \$43,000.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—At the sale of horses from Senator Stanford's Palo Alto stud at the American Institute yesterday "Baby McKee" was sold to Frederick P. Olcott of this city for \$25,000.

Baby McKee is two years old and a full brother to Arion, the Electioneer colt recently sold to J. M. Forbes of Boston for \$125,000.
