awarded.

Commonwealth vs. Charles Penny-packer, adultery, a true bill.

Commonwealth vs. Charles Penny-packer; assault and battery, and assault and battery with intent to kill, a true bill.

Commonwealth vs. Washington Masteller. The Court sentenced the defendant to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of twenty-five dollars, and give bail in the sum of three hundred dollars to keep the peace toward all citizens of the commonwealth, and especially toward his wife and son, Norman Masteller the Prosecutor.

Commonwealth vs. Wallace Seitzinger, lacy. The sentence of the Court was that the defendant pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of twenty-five dollars and under-go imprisonment in the "Huntington Reformatory" and stand committed until the sentence is complied with. The Sheriff to conduct the defendant there within ten days and to be allowed one assistant.

Commonwealth vs. Isaac Schoufeel. A true bill. Recognition of the defendant was forfeited in open Court, George B. Reimensnyder Adm'r of Anna Maria Creveling, deceased, vs. Elmer C.
