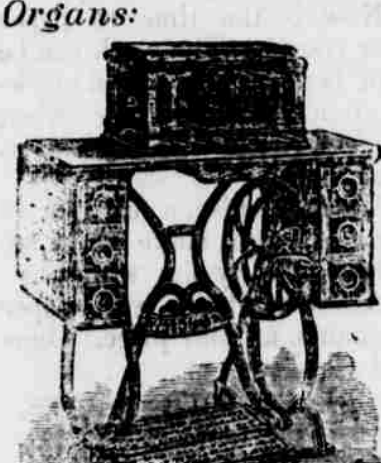

**DEMOCRATS OF NEW YORK**

Hold Their State Convention at Albany.

EVERYTHING IN FAVOR OF HILL.

Delegates Instructed to Vote as a Unit for Hill at Chicago—Protesters Ignored—Senator Hill Makes a Speech—Gov. Flower at the Head.

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 23.—The Democratic State Convention has been held, and, as was expected, was unanimously in favor of Senator Hill, the delegates being instructed to vote at Chicago for him. Judge George H. Beebe, of Sullivan county, who was temporary chairman, made a vigorous speech, in which, after defining the issues of the coming campaign, he arraigned the Republican Party for extravagance and misgovernment, and wound up by lauding Senator Hill, whom it was hoped the Chicago convention would place at the head of the national ticket.

Gen. Daniel E. Sickles, who was made permanent chairman, also made a speech in which he briefly described Senator Hill's career as governor.

The resolutions were an embodiment of former platforms with the pronounced views of Gov. Hill on the silver question and wound up with the following:

"In obedience to the mandate of the Democratic voters of New York, the delegates selected by this convention are instructed to present to the National Democratic Convention the name of David B. Hill as the candidate for President of the United States, a Democrat who has led his party from victory to victory for seven successive years and who has never known defeat.

The said delegates are further instructed to act as a unit in all matters intrusted to their charge, said action to be determined by the vote of a majority of delegates."

Senator Hill made a speech, and was enthusiastically applauded. The delegates at large are Gov. Flower, Edward Murphy, Jr., Gen. Daniel E. Sickles and Gen. Henry W. Slocum.

**THE PROTESTERS IGNORED.**

Another Convention to be Held in Syracuse May 31.

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 23.—The Committee of Fifty representing the protesters against the "mid-winter convention" were given a cold shoulder. E. Ellery Anderson presented the protest and after a brief discussion the matter was tabled.

The protesters then withdrew, and held a conference in another hall. Ex-Secretary Fairchild, E. Elery Anderson and others made speeches, and it was finally decided to call a convention to meet in Syracuse May 31, to send a delegation to Chicago.

**SHOT DEAD AT A PRIMARY.**

Tragic End of a Political Feud at Tarrytown, N. Y.

TARRYTOWN, N. Y., Feb. 18.—James Hannon, a life-long resident and prominent Democratic politician, was shot and killed last night by Chief of Police George H. Hackett, at the Democratic primaries held in Judge Tracey's office.

The tragedy was the culmination of a bitter political feud, which has existed between the two for some time. There are two Democratic factions in town. Hannon was the leader of one, Chief Hackett belonged to the other. Last night Hannon was speaking when Hackett tried to stop him. Hannon pulled a club and was about to strike when Hackett shot. Hannon lived half an hour.

**MISSING FROM MORRISTOWN.**

Charles H. Stewart After Being Jilted Disappears.

MORRISTOWN, N. J., Feb. 18.—Charles H. Stewart is missing from his home in Morristown. On the evening of January 11 he left home, saying he was going to Littleton to spend the evening with his brother Robert. He never reached his brother's house, and since that time no trace of his whereabouts has been discovered.

Stewart is a landscape gardener, and a few months ago furnished a cosy home and expected to be married. When the time arrived for the marriage his intended bride changed her mind. The disappointment proved a bitter one to Stewart. It is feared that while laboring under mental depression he made way with himself.

**GREAT FIRE IN NEW ORLEANS.**

Property to the Value of Millions Destroyed.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 18.—A fire which broke out late last night in A. Swartz & Son's dry goods store, corner of Canal and Bourbon streets, spread to other stores and burned nearly all night. At 2 o'clock this morning the fire was burning fiercely and had already destroyed property to the value of \$2,000,000.

**Mr. Seney's Colonization Scheme.**

SALUTE STE. MARIE, Feb. 20.—S. E. Davidson, of Hull, Ia., and George I. Seney and other New York capitalists have purchased 20,000 acres in this country and will colonize it with Germans and Scandinavians. They will clear 2,000 acres and build a dozen farmhouses next season. The land was bought of the Detroit and Marinette Railway Company.

**Heirs to \$17,000,000.**

FORT DODGE, Ia., Feb. 19.—Mrs. Thomas McGuire, of Lehigh, and Mrs. Wilford Carson, of Dayton, have been notified they are heirs to a fortune of \$17,000,000 from an old Scotland estate. Mrs. T. Woolsey Homer, and Mrs. J. McGuire, of Webster City, are also on the list of heirs.

**OUR GOLD GOING ABROAD.**

First Shipment of Half a Million Went Saturday.

New York, Feb. 20.—Considerable excitement was caused in financial circles yesterday by the news that \$500,000 in gold coin had been engaged at the Sub-Treasury for shipment to Europe. The gold was ordered by Heidelberg, Ichelheimer & Co., and it will be shipped to the continent on to-day's steamer. Rumors were current on Wall street, yesterday, that \$1,300,000 additional will be ordered early next week for shipment on Wednesday.

It is by many feared that this shipment is simply the beginning of another drain on American gold reserves such as was experienced last year. According to a statement furnished at the Assay Office there were shipped from the port of New York between February 13, and July 24 last year \$69,995,657 in gold. On March 5, the Treasury Department issued an order discontinuing the practice of furnishing gold bars to exporters in place of coin, and although coin was less desirable as an export on account of the loss in weight caused by abrasion etc., the order had no effect in checking the gold efflux.

The only explanation offered by bankers of the abnormal investment is that Europeans have a great fear that this government is tending toward a silver basis. The Sub-Treasury has now on hand \$80,000,000 in gold coin. When last year's gold exports commenced the supply was \$112,000,000.

**SHOT AT THE SCHOOLMARM.**

A School where the Young Idea Doesn't Need to be Taught to Shoot.

LANSING, Mich., Feb. 20.—Miss Mary McHenry, teacher in the Townsend street school, attempted to whip Guy Cottingham, a ten-year-old pupil. The youngster resisted, pulled a revolver and fired at the teacher. The bullet missed, and the plucky teacher took the weapon from him and then fainted.

The principal of the school made all the boys in the building march out and empty their pockets. Thirteen pistols and revolvers, some of them loaded, besides several boxes of cartridges were found.

**HYER SURRENDERS.**

The Jersey City Absconder Returns from San Francisco to Stand Trial.

JERSEY CITY, Feb. 18.—John Hyer, who embezzled \$6,000 belonging to his employer and uncle, William Harney of this city, and for whom the police of San Francisco have been looking ever since he escaped from Detective Dalton at Alliance, Ohio, came home Tuesday night. He went directly to his residence at No. 250 Grove street. Yesterday he sent for Police Captain Farrier and surrendered himself. He was taken to the Sessions Court, having already been indicted, and committed to jail.

**BIG STRIKE IN SILVER MADE.**

The Glance Is 36 Inches Thick and in Lumps of Hundreds of Pounds.

FLORISSANT, Col., Feb. 17.—The greatest strike yet made in this camp, which is already become one of the wonders, was made yesterday afternoon in the Blue Bell on Squaw Gulch. A blast in the tunnel opened a body of silver glance, twenty-six inches in thickness. The ore comes out in massive chunks, weighing as high as 300 pounds. The entire matter is almost solid ore. Mr. Geyot, the assayer, says it is the finest silver ore he has seen in years.

**D. D. Withers, the Turfman, Dead.**

New York, Feb. 19.—David D. Withers, the noted turfman and chief owner of the Monmouth race course, died yesterday at the Brevoort House in this city, aged seventy-one. He was born in this city in 1821.

In 1860 he began to be interested in racing. He bought a magnificent farm at Brookdale, N. J., and stocked it with the choicest blood of England. He was the chief stockholder in the old Monmouth track, and, besides, a member of the Coney Island and the New York Jockey clubs. He was absorbed in Monmouth Park, and spent over \$1,000,000 on improvements. He leaves an estate of nearly \$4,000,000.

**Four Miners Killed.**

PLATTSBURG, N. Y., Feb. 18.—Timbers in the roof of the Arnold ore mine at Ferona, this county, gave way yesterday morning while the full force of men were at work. The following men were killed outright: Conrad Dowey, single man; William Nolan, aged forty-five, married and father of a large family; Henry Patnew, aged forty-nine, married.

Patrick Dowd, subsequently died of his injuries, leaving a wife and family.

**A Benedictine College Burned.**

MANCHESTER, N. H., Feb. 19.—The new Benedictine College building was burned last night. It has been in process of erection since early last summer and was nearly completed. It was of brick, five stories high. The loss is about \$60,000. Father Hugo, the rector, is in Philadelphia. The cause of the fire is not known. Only the outside walls are standing.

**Anarchists Jailed in Spain.**

CADIZ, Feb. 17.—There are now
